Reding baseball team hammers the 'Ridge to reach the final four

Royals strike early and often on way to lopsided quarterfinal win

Bishop Reding didn't so much advance to semifinal baseball play as bulldoze its way in.

Exploiting ripe-to-fall opposition at Brian Best Park Thursday, BR booked passage to the final four by dismantling Oakville's Iroquois Ridge Trailblazers 12-3.

Having battled back to edge E.C. Drury 4-3 the previous afternoon, the 'Ridge offered little resistance past the second inning against the Royals — collecting just three hits over the final five frames en route to a humbling playoff exit.

The Trailblazers' quarterfinal efforts were particularly hindered by shaky relief pitching and poor defense from their first-baseman. A blatant mental collapse didn't help matters either.

"They (Iroquois Ridge) fell apart, it's that simple," said Joe Jurus, BR's longtime skipper who's now officially delivered the best baseball season in school history.

That acknowledgment was an encouraging sign heading into

yesterday afternoon's semifinal crossover game with the power-house Notre Dame Irish.

Thursday's lopsided score could have easily opened the door to overconfidence, but Jurus knows it'll take a whole lot more just to give Halton's top squad a respectable run, much less pull off the upset.

He stressed, "If we play like that against Notre Dame, we're not going to win."

Jurus was no doubt referring to a few mental miscues - which to those concentrating on the big picture Thursday, may have gone unnoticed.

Among the more visible cracks in the hosts' quarterfinal campaign were some overzealous base-running — that would have been costly against a stronger fielding opponent — and sub-par defense from third-baseman Dan Digirolamo.

Otherwise, BR was quite sturdy — and certainly dominant — on the way to reaching the semifinals.

Great extra effort by Tennant

The winning run was scored by offensive standout Liam Tennant.

With two outs in the second and the game deadlocked 3-3, BR's 10th grade shortstop belted out a deep single before stealing second and darting home on a hit by Conan O'Brien.

That effort - which highlighted a three-hit, two-run afternoon for the talented young infielder — set the stage for what would be a mismatch the rest of the way, as BR scored half-a-dozen runs in the fifth plus two more for good measure in its last at-bat.

Meanwhile, starting pitcher Chris Dumencu recovered from a less-than-stellar second to finish out his allotted four innings and pick up the victory.

He closed out his stretch with a quick three-up, three-down fourth.

O'Brien worked relief and held the visitors scoreless with three hits over as many innings. He also drove in three runs to continue a thoroughly productive hitting campaign this spring.

Results from yesterday afternoon's semifinal clash with Notre Dame were not available at press time.

If able to stage an upset win, Bishop Reding would advance to tomorrow's regional championship final against either Loyola of Lester B. Pearson.

The Royals went 6-2 in the regular season and earned a couple of honourable mentions in the Greater Toronto Area high school rankings — the second following their quarterfinal win Thursday.
