Milton's up-from-the-ashes lacrosse club has five games remaining in which to reclaim its post-season berth.

Problem is, the next three opportunities come against upper-echelon teams that aren't likely to offer much room for an upset.

A trip to Welland Friday night represented the Mavericks' best shot at win number seven through the mid-stretch of June.

Unfortunately, Milton eased up a little down the stretch — squandering a third-period lead on the way to falling 12-10.

Welland's game winner and insurance marker were potted in the final two-anda-half minutes of play, shortly after the visitors scored shorthanded goals just five seconds apart to even the count.

The Mavericks held the upper hand for much of the contest but just couldn't

break away — due in large part to hometown sniper Travis Hill, who struck six times and netted the last two past goaltender Josh Arnold.

Welland's victory was also fueled by three powerplay goals. By contrast, the Maverick's had just five tries with the man-advantage and were neutralized each time.

Kyle Goertz was once again the player of the game with a goal and three assists, while Paul Pedulla had a single helper to go along with his pair of markers.

Also tallying twice were Steve Chuchmach and Mark McComb—arguably the most improved Maverick, at least offensively, in recent weeks.

Derek Mewhinney, Kyle Johnston, Drew Petkoff and Zach Somer chipped in singles.

Maverick notes: Kyle Goertz represented Milton at Saturday's OLA Jr. B All-Star Game and had two assists in an 11-11 stalemate ... Veteran Maverick Kaegen Sherriff has been a no-show since being disciplined for a vicious check-from-behind in Halton Hills June 2 ... Making his season debut with the Mavericks Friday was Mike Novak — a Jr. A Orangeville draft pick who'd been sidelined since April with a wrist injury sustained in rep hockey ... Senior Red Sox win second straight at Brian Best Park

"I'd say six of our nine losses have been the direct result of us beating ourselves," said the local skipper. "We self-destruct."

However, Milton managed to stave off that troubling trend at Brian Best Park Saturday afternoon—severely limiting its follies en route to nipping the Dundas Chiefs 4-3.

The victory was the second straight at home and fifth overall in league play for the Red Sox, who're now on pace to hit the dou-

ble-digit win plateau — something they've been unable to do in several years.

Unlike during Monday's 3-0 loss in St. Catharines and Friday's 8-5 defeat in Etobicoke, Milton didn't let mistakes snowball against Dundas Saturday.

According to Moore, that was the chief reason for the team's triumph. He said, "We were able to avoid that one big (bad) inning. We didn't beat ourselves."

The lion's share of Milton's production came in the opening frame when lead-off man Nick Aalbers and Nick Mastro clobbered backto-back solo home runs — the first two of the season — and Ryan Davison later cashed in DH Kevin Wilson on a two-out single.

While the Red Sox struggled offensively through stretches of the afternoon — particularly in the

fourth when they blew a bases loaded and no outs situation — Ian Zettle's crafty pitching and a near-flawless fielding campaign got them through.

Middle infielders Kurt Mitchell and Manny Thapar were rock-solid through the late going while Zettle earned the victory with a five-hit effort over seven innings.

Nathan Tami picked up his second straight save, working the final two innings and delivering a game-clinching strikeout with the tying run in scoring position. Subbing for injured lead-off man Dwayne Johnson, Aalbers went 4-for-5 while Davison drove in Wilson twice — the second time for the winning run in the third inning.

The Red Sox will look to make it three in a row at Brian Best Saturday against Oakville at1:30 p.m.
