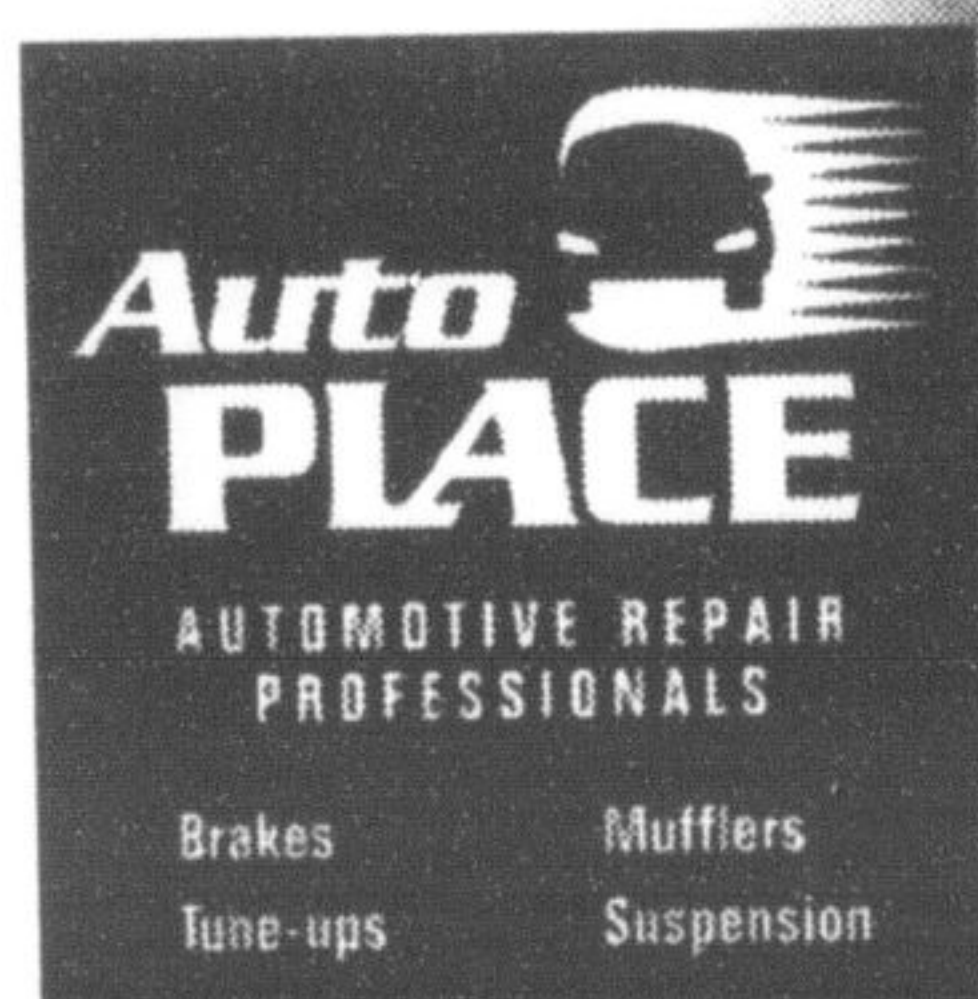

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## Mystics engineer comeback to secure second season win

The Junior Mystics donned their proverbial rally caps to secure season win number two Saturday.

Delivering an impressive finish to salvage tournament efforts in Ancaster, Milton battled back from a three-run deficit to upstage Glanbrook 7-5.

A four-run sixth inning — sparked by Tara Elkie's impressive base running — lifted the Tri County open-class league newcomers to victory, which served as pay-back for a late-inning loss to Glanbrook earlier this month.

Katie McKrory went the distance on the mound to record the win while Carolyn Coates led offensively with two hits and a pair of runs. Alicia Taylor also had a timely double to aid in the come-from-behind afternoon triumph.

The Mystics were out-hit nearly two-to-one against Glanbrook, but walks and speed on the bases helped them prevail.

Beating Glanbrook erased some of the sting felt earlier in the day from a 17-1 pasting provided by the red-hot Oakville Elites — who exploded for 10 runs in the third to add plenty of insult to injury.

Milton had just four hits in the mismatch, with Coates bringing in the lone run.

Oakville by contrast, had a handful of extra-base hits in the third alone.

The Mystics were a whole lot more competitive in round one Friday night, when they fell to the Hamilton Hurricanes 7-2.

Lindsey Harrold faced the brunt of the punishment — giving up five runs on eight hits through three innings on the hill.

McKrory stopped the bleeding to some extent over the balance of the evening clash.

Coates had three hits and a run, while also coming home was Laura Anne Sheehan.

Registering RBI were Shannon MacKenzie and Sarah Mooney.

Milton will begin a two-game road trip in league play tonight in Townsend.

They will travel to Six Nations Thursday before returning home to face Fort Erie June 25. Game time at Lions Sports Park is 8:30 p.m.
