## Police officers' gut instincts net two suspects in house break-in

Sometimes it's about being in the right place at the right time.

Halton Regional Police quickly arrested two Toronto women on break and enter charges after officers saw a suspicious vehicle driving slowly on Maplewood Crescent Tuesday.

Shortly after 12:30 p.m., two officers watched as one of the occupants of the vehicle entered a home through the unlocked front door while the elderly female owner worked in the side garden

The quick-thinking officers deter-

mined the owner didn't know the woman who had gone into the house. They arrested her when she exited the home and seized jewelry and other items. Police also arrested the driver of the car. "We were fortunate we got a lucky break," said Det. Sgt. Don Cousens. "The officers' instincts kicked in and told them the situation just wasn't right."

Two women, aged 49 and 53, were each charged with break and enter and theft. The 49-year-old was also charged with possession of break-in instru-

ments. They were to appear for a bail hearing today in Ontario Court (provincial division) in Milton.

Halton Regional Police want to remind residents to stay alert and ensure their property is secure at all times—even if individuals are working in their yards—to eliminate the possibility of intruders entering through unlocked doors.

## RELIGION AND DEVELOPMENT

The aim of any development process is not just to help people change their physical environment, but also to change themselves. From a religious perspective, one might speak of a spiritual process of becoming - of moving from where people are to where they want to be. Then, from the same perspective, one might ask whether meaningful development is possible unless spiritual principles applicable to the development process are articulated and addressed during that process. See for yourself the differences between religious and non-religious development projects, when Canadian values are applied to development work around the world, in a series of half-hour TV programmes entitled "Global Villagers" being rebroadcast on Vision TV from June 7th through August 30th.

This series explored why some Canadians dedicate themselves to development - trying to form partnerships with the world's poor, and it describes the impact Canadian culture has on several social development projects. Each week portrays a project sponsored by a different group including: the Canadian Baha'i Community, the Canadian Council for International Co-operation, the Canadian Council for International Co-operation, the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA), the Canadian University Service Overseas (CUSO), the Christian Reformed Church World Relief Committee, the Development and Peace organization, the International Development and Relief Foundation, Jesuits International, the Mennonite Central Committee, Oxfam, the Salvation Army, Scarboro Missions, Vision TV, and

World Vision. Albert Nokes, Director of Independent Production at Vision TV said: "Global Villagers puts a Canadian face on the issues - helping us see more clearly the great tenacity and compassion of those involved".


On Saturday, June 22nd & Friday August 9th, the programme entitled "Developing Capabilities" focuses on the Baha'i sponsored Foundation for the Application and Teaching of Sciences in Colombia, which has been acknowledged as one of the true success stories in the international development field over the last two decades. It's impact, involving a new approach to universal education in Colombia's rural communities, has helped local economies and become a viable model for the developing world. Another project which typifies the Baha'i perspective that development projects must incorporate spiritual principles in order to be successful, is the New Era Development Institute in Panchgani, India. This institute attempts to apply the spiritual principles of non-partisan participatory consultation and gender equality at all levels within their development programmes. Consultation is a particular challenge when people are illiterate. Villagers who participate in the Institute are asked to portray their life on paper when they arrive. They draw what their village is like and are asked to draw it as they would like it to be. It is a simple but effective approach that could work almost anywhere in the world. Many of the drawings are

strikingly similar - done with childish ease, showing little regard for perspective or symmetry depicting relatively haphazard arrangements of houses and streets filled with animals, children and men and women gathered for the most part separately or by communal TV sets. Drawings of a future ideal village usually depict bigger houses with TVs, straight roads with lots of vehicle traffic, tractors in the fields, and community buildings like schools and a hospital. People are often missing from these drawings however. Intuitively, villages feel they might not 'fit' into the new surroundings. This confirms that development is not just bringing change to people, but bringing people to change. People don't automatically change with their environment. Real change means that 'Spiritual' issues like attitudes, co-operation, gender roles, etc. need to be addressed so that the social environment can change with the physical surroundings.

Invariably, people need a model to inspire them to change. The scriptures of the great world religions have been a source of such inspiration - portraying the ideal of human betterment, divine sanction and guidance to achieve it. In both the developing and the developed world, in Panchgani or in Milton, meaningful development requires a renewal of faith as well as a renewal of environment.
