## Additional 'Greenland' locations proposed in Official Plan review

Designated 'Greenland' areas throughout Halton may increase in volume through the Official Plan (OP) review process.

committee approved an early release of reports outlining new areas for inclusion as Greenland's A and Greenland's B designation Wednesday.

The release of the reports initiates a public consultation process and doesn't represent the final outcome.

Development of lands labeled as Greenland's A — which include provincially-significant wetlands and floodplains — is prohibited.

The majority of lands proposed to be added under Greenland's A involve minor expansions of previously designated lands. The Knatchbull Wetland Complex in north Milton has also been added.

Also released was a proposed 50 per cent

increase in Greenland's B areas.

The new lands — consisting of regionally-significant wetlands, provincially and regionally-significant areas of natural and scientific interest, significant woodlands and environmentally-sensitive areas — sit Halton's planning and public works mostly on the Niagara Escarpment, but several new small areas are proposed throughout the region.

Boundaries for the Trafalgar Moraine and Acton swamp have yet to be determined, but both are considered Greenland's B.

An Environmental Assessment (EA) is required prior to development on these lands. The EA would have to demonstrate the overall environment wouldn't be negatively impacted by such development prior to receiving regional approval to build.

The released mapping is subject to change not only through the public consultation process, but as more information comes forward from Conservation Halton and the Province.

Numerous north Oakville landowners criticized Halton Region for not making it clear in the documentation that the reports are in draft form and changes are possible.

"We ask you to please indicate these reports as draft reports so as not to prejudice the public consultation process," said David Faye of Star Oaks Development.

The comment was reiterated by Lynn Townsend-Renaud, representing North Oakville Management Inc.

However, a cover letter included in the is subject to change following consideration of public comments, Ho Wong of Halton's planning department explained to the committee.

Public consultation on the greenlands, as well as the rest of the Official Plan review — expected for release later this year will continue through early 2003.

A final document will be presented to regional council for consideration following the public consultation process.


A pair of national awards were handed to the Milton Canadian Champion during an industry awards ceremony Thursday in Halifax.
