Recipients of cash from Healthy Community Fund announced

Projects aimed at making Halton a better place to live and work received a \$252,000 cash injection recently, thanks to the Healthy Community Fund.

The funds are provided by a number of community partners, including the four area municipalities, Halton Region, the Ontario Trillium Foundation and the United Way.

"Part of our mandate at Halton Region is to work with our partners in the community to help improve the quality of life for all our residents," Regional Chair Joyce Savoline said in a press release.

"The Health Community Fund is a prime example of how we can all work together to provide much needed programs and services in our communities."

A total of 15 groups throughout the region will receive the allocated funds.

Recipients impacting Milton include

the Halton Community Investment Partnership, which is getting \$50,000 (over two years) for consultants to develop best practices models.

Parents and families living with AIDS will also receive \$9,000 to hire a project coordinator for the Miriam Group — which holds group meetings to promote healthy living.

Further funds are going to the Expressive Art in Long-Term Care Facilities project. Activity departments at these facilities will receive \$17,500 to establish art programs responsive to residents with dementia.

The Halton Music Therapy Program is getting \$73,500 (over three years) to cover support staff and transportation costs related to bringing their services to mental health survivors.

"The groups that were awarded funding clearly outlined plans that involved community participation and joint planning between groups," commented Burlington Councillor Rick Craven, chair of the Healthy Community Fund.

Additional funding recipients with a Milton influence include the Halton Database Co-ordination Project, which is getting \$50,000 (over two years). The money will be used to hire a part-time person to integrate various community, health and social services databases on-line.

A part-time coordinator is joining the Victorian Order of Nurses Alzheimer Services Enhancement Project team, thanks to \$75,000 (over three years) in funding.

The Allendale Foundation is taking home \$5,000 to host the upcoming First Annual Apple Festival and Wellness Event.

Sexual abuse treatment and prevention programs at the Halton Trauma Centre are also receiving \$25,000.

'People In Crisis' program gets grant

It's money well spent.

In an effort to help support VON Halton's People In Crisis program, the Ontario Trillium Foundation has awarded the organization a three-year grant of \$120,000.

"The People In Crisis program helps more than 600 Halton residents each year," said Russ Hunt, president of VON Halton.

"This unique and innovative service is the first of its kind in Ontario, and we are very thankful for Trillium's continued support of community initiatives."

Program for at-risk residents

The program was established in 2000 to provide specialized nursing services to Halton's most vulnerable, at-risk residents. It works together with community agencies that provide safe and supportive environments for women, children and youth experiencing neglect, abuse, homelessness, addictions, crime and mental health concerns.

Partnering agencies include Halton Women's Place, Transitions for Youth, Community Youth Programs, Woodview Children's Centre, Our Community Cares and Deep Impact Human Services.

- When we are finished for the day on your street (times indicated in the BLUE LETTER) please turn on the cold water tap in your basement and let it run until the water is clear.


