NOTICE OF THE PASSING

OF ZONING BY-LAWS BY

THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF MISSISSAUGA

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the City of Mississauga passed By-laws 0320-2002, 0321-2002 and 0322-2002 on the 10th day of July, under Section 34 of the Planning Act R.S.O., 1990, c.P.13, as amended.

AND TAKE NOTICE that any person or agency may appeal to the Ontario Municipal Board in respect of the By-laws by filing with the Clerk of the City of Mississauga not later than the **6th day of August, 2002**, a notice of appeal setting out the objection to the By-laws and the reasons in support of the objection, together with a cheque in the amount of \$125.00 for each of the By-laws payable to the Minister of Finance.

Only individuals, corporations and public bodies may appeal a Zoning By-law to the Ontario Municipal Board. A notice of appeal may not be filed by an unincorporated association or group. However, a notice of appeal may be filed in the name of an individual who is a member of the association or group on its behalf.

Explanation of the purpose and effect of the by-laws:

By-law 0320-2002 to amend Zoning By-law 5500 (former Town of Mississauga), and By-law 0321-2002 to amend Zoning By-law 1227 (former Town of Port Credit) and By-law 0322-2002 to amend Zoning By-law 65-30 (former Town of Streetsville) by:

adding a clause to the parking requirements for Places of Religious Assembly in the general provisions of the Zoning By-laws. The clause requires any property used as a Place of Religious Assembly and a public hall, banquet hall or community/multi-use hall, where the public hall, banquet hall or community/multi use hall is the same size or larger than the worship area of the Place of Religious Assembly, to provide parking for

the public hall, banquet hall or community/multi-use hall at the rate of 10.8 spaces/100 m² GFA (10 spaces/1,000 sq.ft. GFA), in addition to the parking required for the Place of Religious Assembly.

Habitat for Humanity spreading its wings

Habitat for Humanity is going regional.

Burlington's Habitat For Humanity announced this week that it's being renamed Habitat for Humanity Halton.

The local chapter is part of the international, independent, not-for-profit, faith-based housing program dedicated to the elimination of substandard and poverty housing by building homes in partnership with families in need.

Becoming a regional affiliate means the local chapter will be able to serve a greater segment of the local community, said board Chair Perry Catena. "The number of families living at or below the poverty line in Halton continues to grow. Some of the rental accommodation that's available not only takes upwards of 50 per cent of these family's funds but is often in such disrepair that most people wouldn't even consider renting it."

Habitat depends entirely on the generosity of corporations and individuals, so the move to Habitat Halton should provide a much larger group of potential donors to which the volunteers can seek support.

And it looks like the name change is already paying dividends.

Employees from Burlington's Cumis Group recently donated almost \$7,500 to Habitat to help finance the kitchen of the group's second home to be built in Burlington. The money was raised as part of the employees' Heart of the Home fundraiser, launched two months ago.

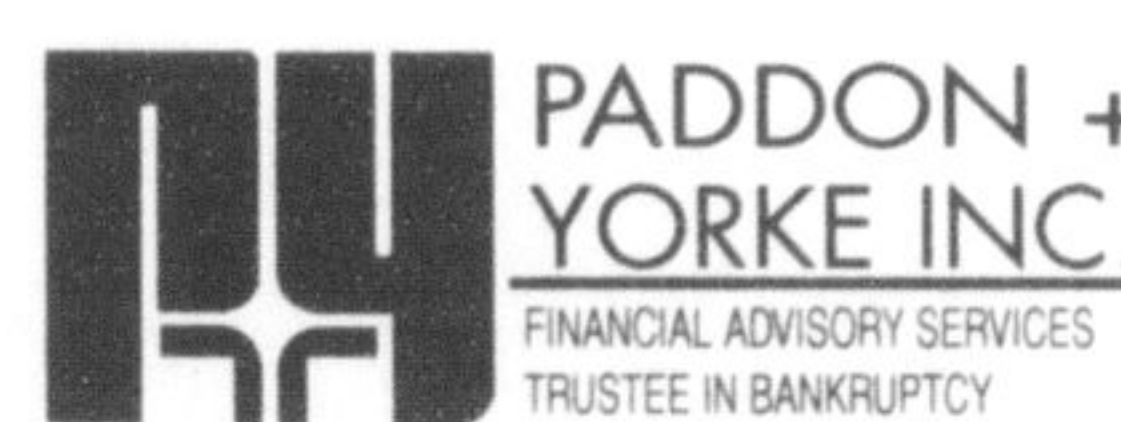
Last fall, Habitat completed its first home in Burlington and ground-breaking for its second project is set for August.

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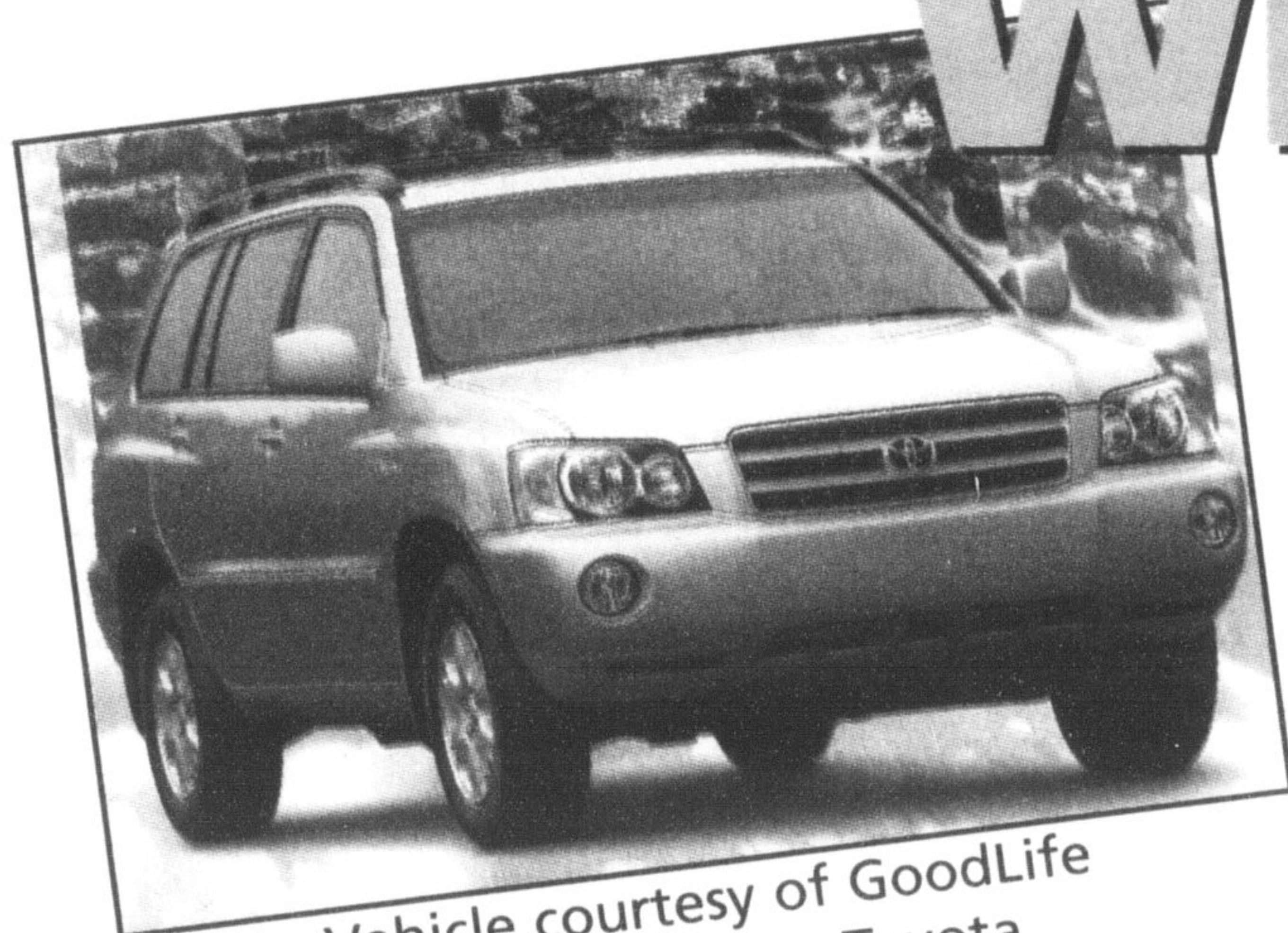
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
