Stecchino's fine food, ambience pleasing patrons

hey knew there was a demand for more restaurant choices in Milton, but the owners of Stecchino's Italian Eatery never expected to be as busy as they are.

"We opened on a Friday, even though everyone said we were crazy to do so, and we've been busy ever since," said owner Christine Manchisi. "They say you should open on a Monday, start the week off slow and work toward the busier days."

Along with husband and co-owner Joe Manchisi, Ms Manchisi spent nearly five months preparing the Steeles Avenue restaurant for its April opening.

It was important to get the ambience just right, she said.

"We've had a great response to the look and the atmosphere of the restaurant," Ms Manchisi said.

Heading up the decorations is a wall-length mural of an Italian coastline — designed to give the appearance of sitting on a patio overlooking the ocean.

"People are coming in just to see the artwork in here," she continued. "It's all hand-painted. He (Mr. Manchisi) did the design and then the artist took it out of his head."

It may have been the intrigue of a new restaurant that first attracted customers, but serving up a variety of fresh pasta dishes, sea bass and lobster has kept the establishment jumping, Mr. Manchisi said.

"We've actually had to turn people away because it's so busy (on a Friday and Saturday night)," he said. "We haven't even really done any advertising. We just have fresh food that working people can afford."

And the location doesn't hurt them either. Not only is the restaurant situated on one of the busiest roads in Milton, but a number of nearby offices make for sizable lunch crowds, the owners said.

"There's lots of interest here," Ms Manchisi said. "There's usually 60 or 70 people who come for lunch."

For the most part, everything has run smoothly since opening, which is cause for a sigh of relief for Ms Manchisi, who called the couple's restaurant ownership a "fluke."

"I'm actually a banker and my husband sells real-estate. We just wanted to do something different," she said, adding her husband does have restaurant management experience.
