Anderson looking to keep up strong mental play at nationals

avid Anderson is no stranger to bowling over the opposition - only now he's doing it solo.

The Milton Lawn Bowling Club member - who narrowly missed qualifying for the Commonwealth Games earlier this year - has been coming into his own as a singles competitor as of late, and recently advanced to next month's national championships in Winnipeg.

His Ontario title victory - the first in individual play - was punctuated with a 3-0 sweep in second-day playoff action in Agincourt. The championship-clinching win was forged in highly notable fashion, as Anderson battled back from two sizable deficits to knock off long-time fours partner and mentor Brian McCartney of Oshawa 21-17.

"We'd been pretty evenly matched when we had played before, but I'd beaten him the other two times so I knew I had a good chance," said the 38-year-old Miltonian, whose last trip to the pairs nationals in 1994 was marked with a silver medal.

Anderson's rally was sparked by a crucial three-point shot halfway through the match. He recalled, "I took out two of his bowls and that gave me a lot of confidence. I just went on adrenaline from that point on."

Semifinal play was even tighter, as the eventual champ mounted an early lead but then had to hang on to eclipse three-time provincial gold medalist Bill Cledinning of Simcoe 21-19.

"He's got a habit of chipping away at you, and that's what he did. Fortunately, I held him off," said Anderson.

The Miltonian credits last month's provincial triumph with a stronger mental game, which he hopes will continue in Winnipeg August 18 to 25 - when he heads into play as one of the youngest competitors.

"Obviously I'm shooting for gold. That means an automatic berth onto the Canadian team, which is a big motivation."

A spot on the national team opens the door to international competition. Anderson is tentatively scheduled to be part of the Canadian team's trip to Hong Kong in November.

His last global competition - to the 2000 World Championships - was met with 10th-place finishes in both pairs and fours play.


