Halloween rather uneventful in terms of criminal activity, with only the odd gate being carried off from local homes

Time Capsules' are gems of information extracted from past issues of The Champion and other publications to provide a window into Milton's past. Explanatory comment is sometimes provided to place the situation in context.

November 1897

Halloween passed off very quietly in town, with just an odd gate or so being carried off. The boys seem to have more sense than their fathers had when they were boys and apply their time at something more creditable than upsetting their neighbor's outhouses and other foolish work. Or perhaps the fear of the police kept them in?

. . .

Col. J.P. Whitney, the Conservative leader, addressed a good-sized meeting in the town hall last night. A large number from the surrounding district came to town to hear the new leader of the party. Mr. Whitney arrived on the 5.55 p.m. train on the G.T.R. accompanied by Lieut.-Col. Kerns M.P.P., a deputation meeting them at the station composed of Mayor Dice, Wm. Clements, President of the Conservative Association, Senator McKindsey and J.W. Elliott.

Quite a number of ladies were present. Wm. Clements acted as chairman and on the platform were Mr. Whitney, Lieut.-Col. Kerns, David Henderson, M.P., Mayor Dice, Warden Hutcheon, Messrs. Fred Kerns, J.W. Elliott, E.W. Boyd, D.F. Elliott, Geo. Allen, Geo. Winn, Wm. Patterson, Wm. Little, R.L. Hemstreet, Phillip Walker, Jas. Henderson, J.F. Richardson, G. Joyce, T. Henderson, Mat. Dice and G.L. Henderson.

The band, in years gone by, after the fall fairs were over, discontinued practice until late in the following spring and were therefore unable to take up anything when they started again with quicksteps, simple waltzes, polkas, etc.

. . .

Now it's about time that they should make a change and practice during the winter months at least one night in the week.

Members who will not attend regularly should be bounced bodily as they keep better men out of the band and keep the others behind. Let practice start at once and we will have a first class band for the next sea-

December 1897

The Guelph hotel keepers have adopted and published the following tariff: Owing to the advances in the price of liquors the hotel-keepers in this city have adopted the following price list: — Brandy, rum, gin, Scotch and Irish whiskey and all case goods to be 10 cents per glass or three for 25 cents.

Ginger beer and whiskey and ginger ale and whiskey 10 cents. Collins drinks, 15 cents or two for 25 cents. All hot liquors 10 cents.

William Johnson, a shoemaker, who has been in the employ of Thos. Wilson and Son for a few years, died on Sunday. He had been suffering for some time with cancer. His remains were interred in the new cemetery (Evergreen) at the expense of the town on Monday. The deceased leaves a widow and one child in very poor circumstances.

Here is a chance for those charitably inclined, as Mrs. Johnson is in poor health and the boy is a little fellow about six years

At the entertainment at Ligny School on the evening of the 22nd a number of youth organized in an attempt to break up the gathering. The chairman, Rev. Mr. Finney, called them to order but was treated with contempt and insulted. Some school furniture was smashed and the decorations prepared by the teacher and pupils were torn

About a dozen of the young men will parade before Mayor Dice tomorrow on the complaint of the trustees of the school.

Provincial government's increase of longterm care costs is ridiculous, says reader

(The following letter was addressed to Premier Ernie Eves and a copy was filed with The country and don't receive recogni-Champion.)

Dear Editor:

I'm absolutely appalled and outraged by the recent announcement from Queen's Park regarding the unbelievable increase in rates for residents in long-term care facili-

First of all, I received the notification July 5 from the director of long-term care facilities that stated "the facilities are required to provide at least 30 days written notice and that the rate would increase August 1, 2002."

believe that's not a 30-day notice. Secondly, many of these residents don't have the large pensions that are received by more recent retirees or that are paid to retired elected government officials/employees.

Many of them are also veterans who have already served their tion for this as their income exceeds their means. Now our elected officials stab them in the back, ignoring their own advisers and demanding residents who are able to pay, subsidize those who are unable to pay.

I understood that this is the government's responsibility and why we already pay such hefty taxes. Rates at Allendale, in the region of Halton, have in our case risen from \$1,764.18 to \$1.977.80 per month — 12 per cent increase or \$65 more per day.

On top of this, we must also pay for those drugs not covered by the government, which amounts to approximately \$200 per month.

As well, where one spouse resides in the facility and the other in the community, the cost for

accommodation is totally out of control.

It's totally ludicrous to put this burden on people who are already vulnerable, no longer wage earners and that are already experiencing a vast decrease in any investment interest income they may have.

It appears the government will ensure there are no funds left, and make them more dependent on the government — taking away whatever dignity and independence they may have left.

Shame on Queen's Park. I believe one must remember this when election time comes around. If the private sector ever tried this, I wonder how long they would get away with it.

This should be reconsidered immediately.

I've read The Champion twice weekly for 10 years, but I've never read such a bunch of crap until recently. Could we please get onto something more newsworthy?




