Fire department under close eye of fire marshal

The Milton Fire Department is under watch by the Ontario Fire Marshal due to a lack of community fire prevention programs and poor response times.

Last week, Ontario Minister of Public Safety and Security Bob Runciman released a list of 15 communities being monitored by the Ontario Fire Marshal (OFM) — one of which is the Milton Fire Department.

"They (OFM) had a concern about our response time," said Milton Fire Chief Harold Penson. "They recommended a 10 and 10 (10 firefighters to the scene within 10 minutes of the 911 call) response to all structure fires. Since we hired firefighters around the clock at the station in July, we've been looking at how to improve our response time. We're not hiding from it. We're dealing with it."

Although he said he didn't know what the average response time has been since hiring full-time firefighters, he did say the average response time was 11 minutes prior to the station operating 24 hours a day. "It might be a little longer in the rural area. We wanted to wait a few months

since hiring the full-time guys before we looked at our response time. I'd say the full-time firefighters are on scene within three to four minutes now. We will definitely hit 10 and 10."

He said the OFM has been keeping tabs on the department for a year-and-a-half following a house fire on Trafalgar Road.


Chief Penson said the Oakville Fire Department was originally dispatched to the scene and called the Milton department for back-up. By the time the local station arrived on scene 17 minutes later, the house was fully engulfed.

The OFM has been regularly visiting the station to make sure the department is operating up to standard, the chief said.

He said the department is also looking at ways to improve its fire prevention programs. "We've been working with the fire marshal in completing a risk assessment of the town. We've been looking at public education and areas like senior buildings, where there could be serious hazards, and we started building our fire prevention around it. We also started our smoke alarm program in the town and in the rural areas."


