Students plea for school to stay open

Instead of celebrating his eighth birthday at Chuck E. Cheese's, Galen Harris presented a petition he started to Halton District School Board officials Tuesday night.

In the span of one week, the youngster gathered 101 signatures from fellow students in hopes of convincing board members to keep Martin Street School open.

About 60 residents came out to the second and final public meeting of the board's School Closure/Consolidation Study Committee to express opposition to the proposed closing of the 82-year-old school.

Fifteen delegates appeared before the committee to convince members not to close the school.

One of the delegates was 6-year-old Ann Allore, who told board officials she didn't want to spend extra time on the school bus travelling to another school.

"We have a computer lab, a great playground and lots of room to run outside. I don't want to move to a new school next year. I know the teachers, the secretary and the custodians. The teachers still ask how my sister is doing and she's now at W.I. Dick. If you care about a little kid's feelings, please don't close my school."

Galen's father, Randy, said the Martin Street family is a community, not a catchment area.

"We are trusting you will make the right decision," he said. "You won't just be closing the school, you would be destroying it. When I heard it might be closing, I thought it was crazy. Isn't there the possibility for re-building? Plus Milton is growing rapidly. Shouldn't we be building instead of destroying?"

As a former Martin Street student, Sarah McDuffie told the committee she had many fond memories of her time spend inside the school walls.

"The school offers quality education, period. The relationship between staff and students is positive and students and parents feel valued. Please don't let another big box school be built at Martin Street's expense."

Sue Leeder said she'll consider sending her children to private school if Martin Street is shut down.

"Seven years ago, when my children first attended the school, I defended the public school system to my friends who enrolled their children in private schools or had them home-schooled. Now I can't defend the public school system to the private and home-schooled families. Now I'm considering what other options are available. I feel my son's well-being is being compromised."

Former town councillor Colin Best told the committee Central Milton Holdings is looking to build low rise and single family homes on 77 acres of land just a kilometre west of the school.

"This could mean over 350 more children living in the Martin Street School area within kilometres," he said, adding construction isn't scheduled to commence until late 2004.

Committee members are also considering closing Percy W. Merry School.

The committee will hold an open house Tuesday at Milton District High School to present alternative proposals for the designation of students should the schools close. The open house will begin at 6 p.m.
