Opens Chic N Tique furniture business

MacDonald had always dreamed of owning her own business.

In October, that dream became reality.

She transformed part of the lunchroom of Moffat Autoworks on Main Street, owned by her two brothers, into what is now her shop, Chic N Tique.

The store is filled with furniture items Ms MacDonald has bought and then redone to give it an antique look. She also sells artificial trees and greenery. A smaller room in the store is used as her work area.

"I'm only open Thursday to Saturday because I need the other four days to redo the pieces and sort them out," she said.

She said she's redone furniture in this particular style for years, but only started to do so seriously for the past three years.

"I would make pieces for my friends and family and they would say I should do it for other people. My brothers offered me the space and that's how I started my own business. I get such a kick out of making the pieces but I wasn't sure if others would

like them."

All furniture sold in Chic N Tique is made of solid wood, Ms MacDonald continued, stressing she doesn't strip the natural colour of the wood, just adds her personal touch to it.

"I work on the pieces both on the outside and inside," she continued, gesturing to the inside of a drawer. "It's my trademark."

The customers that have wandered into her store have showed the most interest in trunks, rocking chairs and greenery, she

"I'm not going to be selling candles, nothing other than wood," Ms MacDonald said firmly. "Every item is one of a kind. I look at a piece and think, what can I do with it?"

Although customers can custom order pieces, she refuses to redo furniture that other people own.

"If the customer doesn't like the finish, then what do I do? If it's mine I can figure out what I want to do with it and then have other people buy it."

So far, Ms MacDonald said she's pleased with the sale figures, as news of her business has been strictly word of mouth up until now.

"I get such a kick when someone likes a piece I have done. I'm hoping this will be successful. This is what I wanted to do so I wanted to give it a shot."
