Local police support de-criminalizing pot on small scale only

But chief says he fears youths getting the wrong message

Potentially looser laws on marijuana possession have received lukewarm support locally but Halton's police chief has expressed concern youths are getting a mixed message about drug use.

A Commons committee, chaired by Burlington MP Paddy Torsney, recommended earlier this month that Canadians should be allowed to grow and carry around 30 grams of marijuana for personal use at the risk only of a ticket and fine, not a criminal record. Marijuana would remain an illegal substance and trafficking in any amount would still be a crime.
