There are a host of other changes around the region within the CSP relating to new school sizes and opening dates. The majority of new schools under consideration are suggested to be built smaller and one or more years later than in the current (2000) edition of the CSP.

One long-range but cryptic notation in the CSP summary that caught the attention a disproportionate share of permanent of several trustees and citizens at last week's school board's meeting was the recommended closure of an unidentified secondary school with approximately 1,200 pupils in 2011.

Board officials said no high school has been singled out for the future closure. However, south of the QEW in either Oakville or Burlington is reportedly the likely target area since that's the region where a disproportionate number of schools are under-utilized.

One Milton parent expressed his displeasure with the CSP by criticizing trustees about the status of Martin Street School.

Brian Cahill said Martin Street, a junior kindergarten to grade 5 school offering French Immersion, is in limbo more than other schools under scrutiny because consideration of its closure has been deferred to this November.

Mr. Cahill said the bigger problem in Milton though is the revised CSP and its


Of the \$6 million Milton receives from the slots every year, \$5 million is put directly into capital improvements, like roads.


The remainder is put into the Milton Community Fund. A seven-member citizen's committee decides how that money is portioned out in May and October of each year.

Criteria has been established to decide which community groups, and the like, get money through this fund.

Also, some of the money goes to Halton Regional Police and Milton District Hospital.

Mr. McQueen said the objective is to make sure all of the money is doled out by the end of the given year.

Mr. Cahill said data supplied by board staff and within the new CSP has convinced him that "far fewer students in Milton will have permanent pupil places than in any other municipality" in Halton in the future.

"There can be no justification for giving school buildings to some municipalities while expecting others to accept many more of (the) less desirable portables."

He contended that by 2019, the final year of enrolment and accommodation projections within the proposed CSP, 98 per cent of Burlington and Halton Hills students and 93 per cent of Oakville's will be housed in main school structures compared to just 83 per cent in Milton.

"The list of building projects and/or the list of school closures needs to be revised so that Milton ends up with more permanent pupil places," he concluded.

"The least costly and least disruptive way to do that would be to remove Martin Street (278 pupil places) from the closure list and replace it with a similar-sized school from some other town. There is a precedent for listing an unnamed school for closure. A similar designation already exists on the secondary school closure list."

In response, Burlington Trustee and board Vice-Chair Debbie Downs reminded Mr. Cahill that long-range projections are never concrete and that the board is committed to reviewing its CSP on an annual basis for any changes to it that may be necessary.

Two public information meetings on the CSP are set for next month. Thomas A. Blakelock High School in Oakville will host the first gathering Monday, Feb. 3 at 7 p.m. Pineview School in Georgetown will be the site of the second open meeting Tuesday, Feb. 11 at 7 p.m.
