## Merchants take bite out of visiting Hounds

Fans at Memorial Arena Thursday night got a genuine taste serving of the wild, wild west.

The west part was delivered equally by the hometown Merchants — who just a few days earlier became a co-leader of the Provincial Jr. A League's Western Conference — and Saskatchewan's Notre Dame Hounds, Milton's most westerly opponents this year.

And as for wild — well despite a little jet lag from the touring Hounds, Memorial Arena was transformed into something more closely resembling the O.K. Corral, with enough both-guns-blazing, free-for-all firepower to make even the Earp brothers a little nervous. The much-anticipated exhibition tilt — the first of three on Notre Dame's Ontario swing — ended with an 8-6 decision for the division-leading Merchants.

The highly-entertaining clash attracted a season-high 600-plus fans, who were drawn as much to appearances by Hockey Night in Canada's Ron MacLean and former Maple Leafs great Wendel Clark — a Notre Dame alumnus — as to the on-ice action.

Milton's shoot-out victory was due in large part to a six-goal surge that began in the dying moments of the first period — to wipe out a 3-0 Notre Dame lead.

Said Hounds captain Paul Geiger, "It's a little faster here. They've (Merchants) got some really quick guys, and without the red line you've always got to be watching the guy behind you."

Echoing those sentiments was visiting head coach Rene Lemire. "This (shoot-out) was very uncharacteristic for us. I don't think we've given up this many goals in a game all season," Notre Dame's bench boss remarked. "Milton really took off on us in the second there."


Fourteen different players lit the lamp in the explosive seesaw battle, which was highlighted by a shorthanded breakaway deposit from standout Merchant Scott Ransom — who along with Rick Janco topped the scoring with a goal and two assists apiece.

The Merchants were physically outmatched against their Saskatchewan foes, but showed a little more spark overall and worked the big outlet pass to full advantage.


"It was great to play with that type of atmosphere (near capacity crowd). We came out a little slow, but overall I think we showed we can play with top teams in other leagues," said Vic Oreskovich, one of eight scorers for Milton Thursday.


Also denting the twine for the Merchants were Wes Clark, James Duhamel, Brad Efthimiou, Ryan Silveira and Rob Ricci—who ignited the turnaround at 18:49 of the first by burying a wide-angle rebound. Cody Spicer delivered the lion's share of the goal-tending, while rookie Alex Evans worked the last 17.19 minutes to put the finishing touches on the victory—stopping all eight shots fired his way after the hosts drew within a goal.

Thursday's comeback victory plus an 11-3 blowout over Brampton the following night pushed the Merchants' home-ice win streak to 18. Overall, Milton is 22-1 at Memorial Arena this season.
