



Merchants ready for Western semis

Milton will face Buffalo for first time in playoffs

The Buffalo Lightning's postseason participation wasn't ensured until late January.

But that doesn't make them a potential pushover for the championship-minded Merchants, according to head coach Mario Cicchillo.

"Buffalo's better than they showed in the standings," Milton's skipper stressed at practice Wednesday night. "There's no way they should have struggled to make the playoffs."

That assessment stems from more than just Buffalo's somewhat improbable first-round victory over second-place Hamilton—who despite being rather depleted offensively were still expected to advance to the Western Conference semifinals.

In fact Cicchillo was among the few who picked the lone American club to reach round two.

"I kept saying there'd be an upset," he remarked.

Though winless in five regular-season games with the Merchants this year, the Lightning kept all but one of those contests tight with their speed and fundamentally-solid play — not to mention some effective rough-housing in their own barn.

While many might feel facing Buffalo instead of Oakville in the second round represents the path of least resistance to the conference finals, Cicchillo says he didn't really have a preference for round two competition.

"We had a couple of practices based on either team. We were ready for both," he explained. "It didn't really matter who we faced because from now on you've got to beat a good team (at every stage)."

Cicchillo said avoiding potentially costly stick infractions as well as odd-man rushes based on mental miscues will be keys to success from this point on.

While eligible to pick up a player to replace second-line rookie Vic Oreskovich — who'll miss the entire second round while competing with Team Ontario at the Canada Winter Games in New Brunswick — Milton's skipper has opted against a temporary addition.

His feeling is that any additional firepower from a 10-day hired gun doesn't justify jeopardizing the team's chemistry.

Instead, he'll call on 40-point freshman James Duhamel — whom he expects great things from next season — to jump in and complete the front-line attack.

Oreskovich should be back in time for most, if not all, of the conference finals, should Milton get past Buffalo.

Meanwhile, the neighbouring Georgetown Raiders will do battle with Oakville in the other division semifinal series.

Both Milton and Georgetown won all five regular season games against their round two opposition — which makes a north Halton Western Conference finals a distinct possibility.

The Merchants would have home-ice advantage for that showdown as well, having finished first in the regular season for the sixth time in the past nine years.
