#### November 1899


If the enthusiastic meeting held on Monday evening counts for anything, the Minto (Milton) Curling Club will have a very successful season. Elected were Patron Judge Hamilton; Patroness Mrs. Hamilton; Hon. President Geo. Hume, President Geo. Storey; Vice President W.I. Dick; Secretary C.F. Johnson; Treasurer G.E. McCraney; Chaplain Rev. Mahaffy; Committee of management W.A. Clark, J.B. Lawrence and D.S. Robertson; Skips Duncan Dewar, J.T. Hannant, Wm. Panton, A. Duff, G. Storey and C.F. Johnson. It was decided that the club will become affiliated with the Ontario Curling Association.

Milton Council, No. 61, R.T. of T., held their annual rally on the evening of Nov. 2nd. There was a large attendance of members, 91 answering to their names as they were called out. The membership at present is 157 and it's expected to meet the Grand Council in February with 200 members. A committee has been appointed to make the necessary preparation for the Grand Council meeting when many will visit our town for the first time.

The town hall was not large enough to accommodate the crowd that turned out to witness the commencement exercises of the public school on Tuesday night. The pupils occupied the centre seats and the remainder of the hall was crowded to the doors. An admission fee of ten cents was charged to all the pupils and the handsome sum of about forty dollars was received. The programme was a very interesting one, the best numbers being the drill performed

by the girls belonging to the schools of Misses Bowes and Lawrence.

The firemen asked for tenders for 25 pairs of rubber boots. The town is furnishing the members of the brigade with coats, so that they will be better prepared for their work. A Council Committee recommend that members be allowed to take the coas home for convenience on becoming responsible to the corporation for their value. Also that the words "Milton Fire Brigade" be painted on each coat.

Appleby. Talking machines are becoming quite common in this neighborhood. Another has been added to the list, John Edward Moody having recently purchased one in Toronto. The machine, when operated by this scientific gentleman, excels all others that we have seen.

At a meeting of the Minto curling club it was decided to pay the lessees of the rink the sum of \$100 for the use of the rink for five nights in the week. Skaters will have the ice on Saturday nights. The membership fee to the curling club is one dollar with one dollar extra for ice privileges. It's left to the management committee to decide whether or not an admission fee should be charged to non-members to witness any curling matches.

Francis L. White has secured the contract of supplying the Hamilton Gun Club with 100 live pigeons from this vicinity for their annual shooting tournament to be held on January 16, 17, 18 and 19, 1900. This tournament requires 1000 live pigeons and L. White has guaranteed to supply 100. He is ready at any time now to buy all that are saleable in this neighborhood.

#### Councillors' stand on pesticides encouraging: reader

Dear Editor:

Congratulations to Oakville's town councillors.

After many hours of public meetings and council debate, they've passed a motion that will lead to the elimination of non-essential use of pesticides on private lands.

This sends a strong message that we can't be complacent about pesticide use. Of particular note is their decision to start with properties bordering schools, daycare facilities, playgrounds, hospitals, senior residences and the like. The young and the elderly are particularly at risk from pesticide exposure.

In the absence of a strong stance from those in a leadership position, many people will choose to take the path of seemingly less resistance and spray, or hire lawn care companies to spray for them.

What does this cost all of us in the long run? The answer is, we don't know.

We certainly have mounting evidence that pesticides are costing us in terms of our health and the environment. Common sense tell us that destroying a natural eco-system of micro-organisms and beneficial insects will only serve to weaken the system, inviting invasion of weeds and problem insects. We can keep trying to beat Mother Nature into submission, but we will never

Pesticides lead to more weeds and insects, which lead to more pesticides — and on it goes.

The solution — work with Mother Nature. Use natural fertilizers and try deep watering once a week in dry weather to promote a strong root system. These are some basic lawn care steps that will work with your lawn's natural eco-system, building a healthy lawn that naturally resists weeds and problem insects.

Think of your lawn as you would any system in nature - for example, your own body. Feed it well, limit junk food, drink adequate water and as a result you'll strengthen yourself from disease.


