
## Bertoli on fire since return from torn ligament injury

Scott Bertoli had already been a prominent entry in the Trenton Titans' record book heading into this month, holding the all-time franchise mark in a number of categories including assists and total points.

On March 5, Milton's ECHL mainstay added the club's all-time goal-scoring benchmark to his resume — eclipsing Cail MacLean's 79 tallies with two deposits in a 4-3 shoot-out loss to Reading. Three nights later he notched number 81, his 17th this season, to help shade Wheeling 3-2.
