While happy to clinch at home, the local lads' series highlight came in Stoney Creek March 18 — when they overcame a third-period letdown to win 4-3 in overtime.

Brinke provided the heroics, scoring his second of the night with help from Vipond and Justin Bailey. Also lighting the lamp in regulation time were Vipond and Ryan Lecky. Brown, Hannah, Luc Hartwick and Craig Howse had assists.

One night later at home the Winterhawks put Stoney Creek on the proverbial chopping block by toppling them 5-2 at Memorial Arena.

Nevins was outstanding between the pipes and was supported with goals from Brinke, Hartwick, Kearns, Lecky and Vipond. Rounding out the squad were Lucas Reid, Brent Trull, Cole Madansky and Jeff Thomson.

The AA juveniles brought out the proverbial brooms and swept their way to a league championship Saturday.

The Pinnacle Winterhawks took the series in three straight to give Milton Minor Hockey its second juvenile league title in three years — and the first since a short-lived hiatus last season.

The Winterhawks mounted a 2-0 lead before Saturday's game was four minutes old — on short-range deposits by Kyle Burrell and AP Chris Coates — and cruised to victory the rest of the way.

Burrell and Coates would each strike again, while Wes McDougall rounded out the scoring midway through the final frame with a powerplay marker.

In St. Catharines Thursday, Milton put its championship rivals on the verge of elimination with a 5-2 decision — thanks largely to a two-goal effort from Paul Szafer.

Jon Sweetland was steady in net, while chipping in with singles were Coates, Scott McLaughlin and AP Mark Galick.


