Mission accomplished.


Former Milton Merchant captain Craig Macdonald had high hopes of winning the ECAC Division 3 title when he returned to Elmira College in late December.

"That was one of our goals





Instead, officers will be the ones lacing up the skates as Eddie Shack's Battle of the Badges is set to hit the local barn for a 4 p.m. showdown.


Halton's finest will square off against their peers from Toronto, with Shack among the NHL's most personable alumni — donning the zebra stripes to oversee all
