A group of youths re-fueling a van at the Shell station on Martin Street drove away without paying last Friday night.

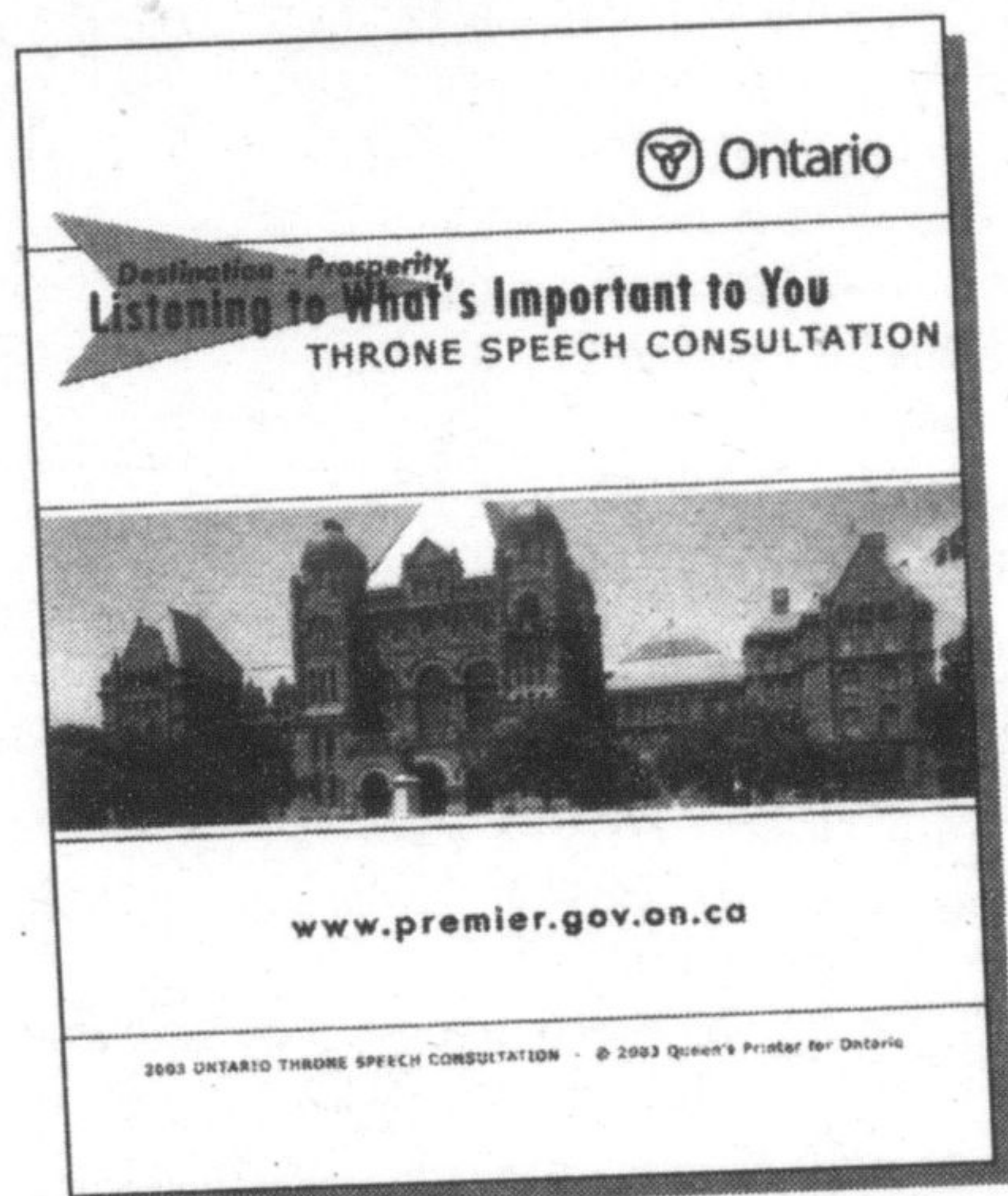
A gas station attendant told police that at about 11 p.m. a red, four-door, 1995 Chevrolet Cavalier pulled up to the gas pump.
