## Bought ticket at pharmacy

"I read the winning numbers in the newspaper and I thought I had five right. I got my wife to check the Internet to see how much the prize was. She asked me if I had checked the bonus number, to which I answered, 'No'. Then we realized I had that, too," Mr. White said when he picked up his prize of \$114,650 from the Ontario Lottery and Gaming Corporation's Toronto prize office.

Mr. White, a retired tool and die maker, said he and his wife, Audrey, haven't yet decided what to do with the \$114,650.

But there will likely be some travelling in the future, he said.

## Pump malfunction doesn't affect water

Residents and businesses in part of northwest Milton didn't receive as much chlorine in their drinking water as usual for a few hours Friday after a pump malfunctioned at Kelso Conservation Area.

The malfunction, which began at about 4 a.m. and involved an area north of Steeles Avenue and west of Martin Street, didn't jeopardize the drinking water, said Bob McMurray, manager of systems operations for Halton Region's planning and public works department.

"There were no health concerns whatsoever," Mr. McMurray said.

At about 9 a.m., the Region discovered the chlorine readings were lower than they should be and the pump was immediately shut down.

In the interim, water was drawn from a reservoir and from wells along Walkers Line, Mr. McMurray said.

By about 11 a.m. a new chlorine pump was installed and brought back on line by about 1 p.m.

He was unsure as to how many people and businesses were specifically affected, but the major residential area serviced by the Kelso well is the Milton Heights subdivision.

The original chlorine pump has been sent away for testing to determine why it malfunctioned. It will be "a few weeks" before regional officials find out the cause, Mr. McMurray said.
