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Mavericks suffer weekend humbling

Coach in search of answers after demoralizing losses

Glen Little says his Mavericks are in need of some serious healing. And he's not talking about injuries.

Instead, Milton's Jr. B lacrosse skipper is referring to the emotional bruises

absorbed from yet another weekend battering - one which dropped the local lads to 1-1-4.

"We're in a certifiable slump, there's no getting around it," Little stressed following Saturday's 13-4 humbling at the hands of the Nepean Knights.

Unlike three previous losses, this latest defeat had little to do with subpar goaltending. Offering his best effort since a season-opening tie with the Clarington Green Gaels, Craig Willis kept his side in a position to win for most of the night.

At least that would have been the case had his teammates delivered even a modest supply of offensive cohesion or creativity. The Mavericks were devoid of both until the last seven-and-a-half minutes — during and captain Kyle Hagel. which they scored three times.

"I'm speechless. We were selfish out there and didn't capitalize on our chances. The wheels just came off," Little said of his team's offensively-frigid performance.

Milton was shut down for the next 51 minutes — due in equal parts to telegraphed shots and an inability to work the ball inside.

Led by six-goal marksman Mickey Gilchrist, Nepean broke free for a number of wide-open goals and exhibited far more versatility than their hosts.

However, Willis and short-lived replacement Jordan Lumb were both victimized by their guests — due at least in small part to an uninspired defensive campaign. This cost the Mavericks a
