#### Whitlock's bid for sub-three hour marathon pushed back until fall

'Just not the right time', says avid runner

Ed Whitlock's bid for a sub-three hour marathon has been put on hold.


The avid local runner hopes to become the planet's first 70-and-older runner to complete a marathon (42.2 kilometres) in under three hours — and had initially eyed this past weekend's race in Ottawa as the site for his latest attempt.

But a less-than-stellar half-marathon performance in Buffalo late last month suggested that this spring isn't ideal for a record-breaking pursuit.

"I probably won't try again until the fall," he said.

The 72-year-old racer came heartbreakingly close to dipping under the three-hour mark exactly two years ago - May 13, 2001 — in London, when he set a new world benchmark in the division with a 3:00.24.

Whitlock was sidelined for much of the next 18 months with a knee injury, that in all likelihood originated from his recordsetting effort.
