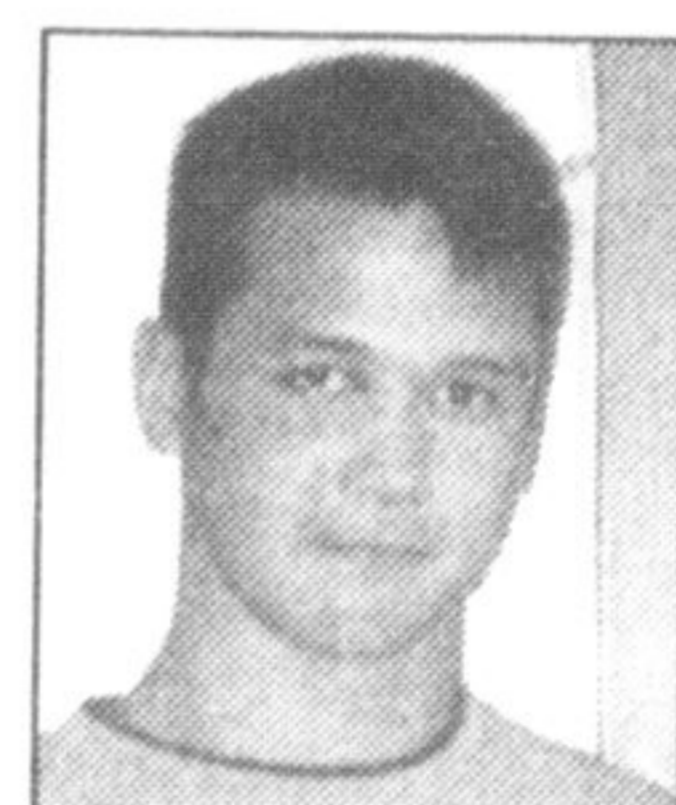
DATELINE DRURY

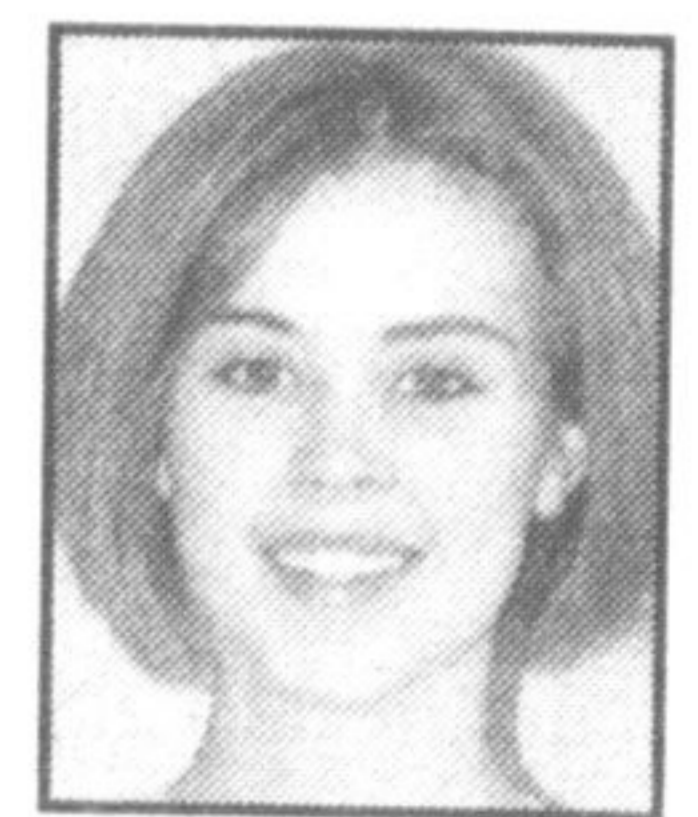

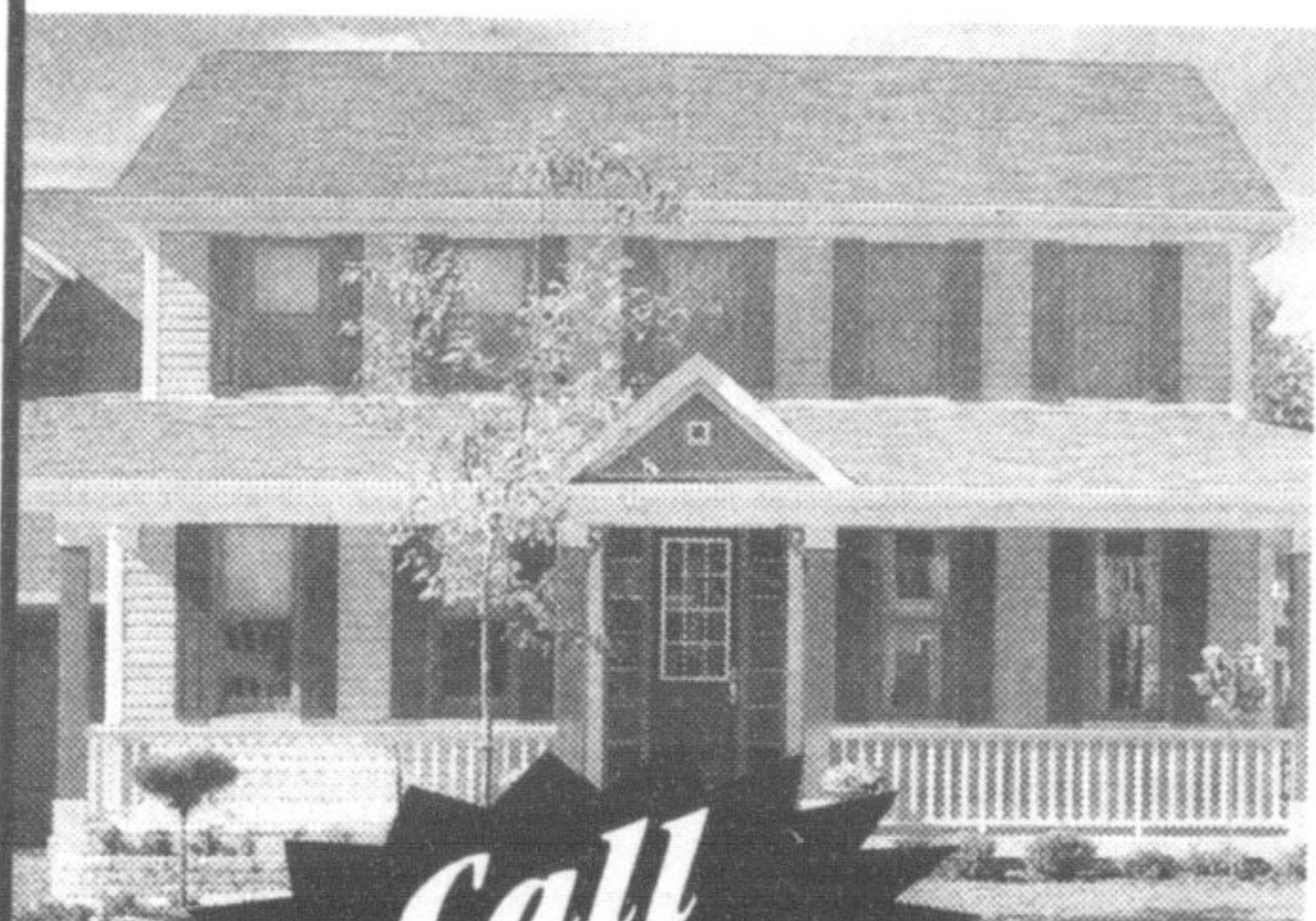
