national average in its number of officers per capita.

"We're doing a lot of great things out there," he stressed, noting that proactive policing programs and community partnerships have had a positive impact on crime rates.

With population growth factored in, police statistics show a decrease in both violent crime and property crime in the last year, as well as a 1 per cent drop in the overall crime rate.

Milton continues to have the highest crime rate in the region, but Chief Algar blamed that largely on the impact of the Maplehurst facility.

Last year, Milton generated about 2,700 police calls — but about 450 of those involved the local jail.

Wednesday's meeting was organized as part of the police service's process to create a business plan for 2004 to 2006.

Don Robinson, chair of the police services board,

said the force wants public input into its plan.

"There's a balance we have to strike," he said. "The board has a responsibility under the Police Services Act to govern, but we also have a responsibility to the taxpayers to do it economically."

#### Minimal turnout

The session attracted only a handful of members of the public, who suggested the service needs to make officers more effective to keep costs down, as well as improve the communication and marketing of its programs.

The board's new business plan is due to be completed this fall.
