Milton's former mayor set to challenge current one in the municipal election

'Time Capsules' are gems of information extracted from past issues of The Champion and other publications in order to provide a window into Milton's past. Explanatory comment is sometimes provided to place the situation in context.

January 1901

The municipal and school trustee nominations were held on Monday. Mayor Deacon is again a candidate for mayor and will be opposed by former Mayor Dice. R.L. Hemstreet was nominated but withdrew. Both candidates addressed the electors. Mr. Dice is seeking election because of his seven years' experience as mayor and because he had a good deal of spare time — more than his opponent — to devote to the business of the town, promising to look after it faithfully, as he claimed he did when in office before. He considers Mayor Deacon a little selfish in asking for re-election.

Mr. Deacon, in his reply, said that though he might have less spare time than Mr. Dice might, he didn't think that anyone could say he had neglected his municipal duties. Some people could get through more work in a given time than others. He didn't think he could be fairly accused of selfishness. He had offered publicly at the nomination to withdraw in favor of Mr. Hemstreet.

He thought he had as good a claim for reelection as Mr. Dice, who had held the mayor's position longer than he. Both gentlemen discussed the municipal business of the town very good-naturedly and the few shots they took at each other were not at all vicious.

On Christmas day each employee of the Milton Pressed Brick Company was presented by the company with a turkey as a Christmas gift. It took 42 to go around.

The men all expressed their great appreciation of the kindness on the part of the company.

. . .

Engineer Frank Brothers died last week in Cuba, where he was engaged in the construction of a railway. He was well known in this county in the early '70s, when the first grading of the Credit Valley, now C.P.R., line was done. He was walking boss and superintended the work of the steam shovel.

He left a widow and a son 17 years of

age, who live at Toronto.

The beginning of the 20th century was duly observed in Milton. Special services were held at Grace Church, commencing at 10.15 p.m. and closing after midnight. The attendance was large. At midnight the town bell rang, the carpet factory whistle was blown and there was a lively fusillade, either of giant firecrackers or guns. The noise was fairly deafening, but it didn't last

Wm. Elliott and Robert Dewar, who left Milton together in June 1899 for the Northwest territories, both returned home last week, though they didn't travel together. Mr. Elliott was the first to arrive. He has been employed on a steamer, which runs on the McKenzie River. Mr. Dewar, after being in Brampton a day or two, got here on Tuesday. He was in charge of a fur trading post in Fort Good Hope, 1,600 miles north of Edmonton and about 400 north-east of Dawson.

He was the only white man permanently stationed there and had no neighbours except the Indians with whom he traded. He and two other men walked from Fort Good Hope to Edmonton with dog trains and covered the distance in 80 days. He heard last July that there was a war in South Africa, but that was all he knew about it until he reached Edmonton. Mr. Elliott will return to his steamer shortly.

Residents of Terra Cotta (Milton Heights) complain that last Sunday a number of Milton youths played a lively game of hockey on the pond of the Toronto Terra Cotta Works, and say that if the aforementioned youths appear there on another Sunday they will find the locality no more healthy for Sabbath breaking than that of Milton.
