

Revenge in sports is always sweet — but particularly so when it's accompanied by a championship victory in front of the hometown crowd.

IceHawks owner eyeing Argonauts

Forgione interested in buying CFL club

Mario Forgione is back at it again.

Just a few short months after buying the OHL Mississauga IceDogs, the Oakville native and Mississauga auto parts manufacturing magnate — who also owns the Tier 2 Jr. A Milton IceHawks (formerly the Merchants) — has begun a bid to break into the Canadian Football League.

He's admitted to being among those interested in taking over the financiallychallenged Toronto Argonauts, whose owner Sherwood Schwarz was removed from power by league commissioner Tom Wright Tuesday.

While Forgione was rumoured to be a potential buyer as early as last week, he only confirmed his intentions yesterday morning.

"I'm an interested party, and that's all I can say at this point," said the IceHawks/IceDogs owner, who up until yesterday hadn't spoken directly with any other media about the issue.

Forgione — who's gradually building a sports/entertainment empire and has hopes of adding to his hockey club collection with semi-pro purchase — had expected to meet with CFL officials this past week.

Although that plan was nixed with Schwarz' removal, overall wishes to buy into the cash-strapped 130-year-old football franchise remain intact.

Said Forgione, "There's still a level of interest there, the model may just have to change. Right now we're stepping back and revisiting the plan."

The Depco International Inc. president is among a consortium of individuals looking to buy the Argos — not unlike the situation with the IceDogs, which he purchased with St. Louis Blues defenceman Chris Pronger.

Forgione stressed yesterday that his CFL endeavours — successful or not — wouldn't affect his involvement with the IceHawks. He added, "I'm a long-term investor. We have no vision to divesting ourselves from any property within our sports/entertainment company."

While some might question the logic of buying the Argos — or for that matter investing in the financially-vulnerable CFL at all — Forgione points to the nearby Montreal Alouettes as an example of the league's potential for both monetary and on-field success.

"These type of opportunities don't come along for successful franchises," he noted. "With the right business plan, this team (Toronto) could work."
