Jr. Mystics fall short of bronze at provincials

The Junior Mystics came so close to winning a provincial medal they could almost taste it.

But instead the local girls fastball team was left to chock down a mighty bitter pill - one of missed opportunity.

In a game guaranteeing bronze against Kingston's Central Frontenac August 17, Milton stranded nine runners on bases on the way to being eclipsed 4-3.

This spelled elimination from the doubleknockout tournament.

"We just couldn't get the key hits across," said manager Roy Harrold, whose squad had the winning run aboard in the fifth with only one out and

the tying run on first with no outs in the seventh each time failing to capitalize.

Nevertheless, the Mystics' Ontario Tier 2 play — to cement the victory. championship efforts marked a significant improvement over last summer - when they took sixth.

Moving up two spots this season was largely the doing of reliable ace Eryl Morgan, who was named the tournament's most valuable pitcher because of two topnotch performances.

In addition to keeping things interesting in the do-or-die medal showdown, she tossed a gem of a game to beat Whitby 2-1 in weekend-opening

Also factoring heavily into this initial win was third baseman Natalee Somenzi, who made all

three outs in the final frame - highlighting her defensive prowess with an unassisted double

Seventh-inning runs were driven in by Christine Brown and Sherylene Leslie, both of whom had two hits.

A 7-3 loss to host Kars (near Ottawa) in round two would put the Mystics on the endangered species list, but they'd stave off elimination — at least temporarily — with a 13-1 annihilation of Grimsby. The third-round encounter had do-ordie implications for both teams, although only Milton performed with any sense of purpose or urgency.

Grimsby managed to put together a five-hit string in the opening frame, but was essentially

neutralized the rest of the way and mercied in the minimum five innings. "Lindsey (Harrold) and the defense went to work after that and really shut them down," Milton's bench boss explained.

Sarah Mooney drove in a handful of runs on two hits, including a bases-clearing double, while Brown and Laura Anne Sheehan also stood out with four hits apiece.

Along with her exceptional pitching, Morgan recorded the only RBI of the bronze-medal clash with Central Frontenac.

Clarkson — Milton's chief rival in league play - went on to beat Kars for the gold.

August 30, 1992



The veteran stock car driver finished one second ahead of Winston Cup star Kenny Schrader.
