## Donaldson Financial Group celebrates 25th year

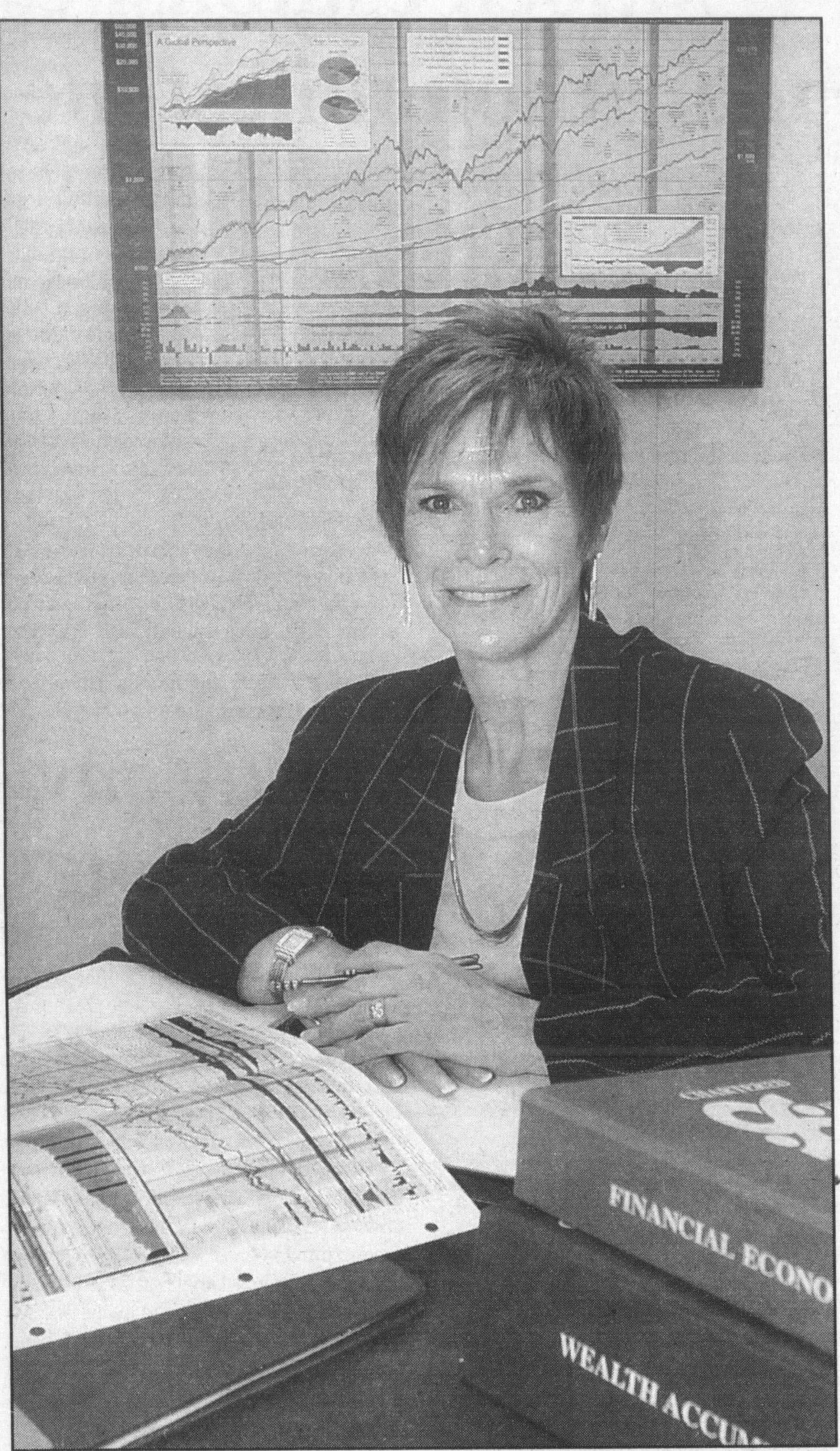
