# Whitlock establishes marathon milestone

First 70-plus runner to break three-hour barrier in 42.2 km

Milton's ageless wonder IVI strikes again.

Already boasting several world records upon taking to the streets of Toronto Sunday, Ed Whitlock added a crowning jewel to his highly-decorated racing career - becoming the planet's first 70-plus runner to complete a marathon in under three hours.

His 2:59.10 feat — delivered at the Scotiabank Toronto Waterfront Marathon - eclipsed a May 2001 attempt that was less than half-a-minute off the mark.

"It's a feeling of relief, and happiness too suppose, to finally do it," said the softspoken 72-year-old. "I'm pretty happy."


yellowish bruises on his face as well as cuts over much of his body — and admits he felt every bit as bad as his unsightly appearance would indicate.

"I was in pretty bad shape at the end. I'd had enough, and I don't think I could have gone much further. I started to develop leg cramps with about a kilometre to go, but I managed to hold it together."

Amid what he described as ideal weather conditions in downtown Toronto, Whitlock was slightly off schedule through the first quarter of his 42.2-km milestone run — but gradually stepped things up, thanks in part to healthy group pace.

Recalled Milton's world record holder, "All of a sudden there were some short kilometres and I was back on schedule."

While that 'in-the-zone' feeling eventually gave way to exhaustion, Whitlock soldiered on — fueled by the notion that his opportunities for breaking the three-hour barrier were on the decline.

Milton District's senior football team suffered a double whammy in Oakville Wednesday.
