

Strong's timely tally lifts IceHawks to victory

he IceHawks' traveling fans are sure getting a lot of bang for their buck on Mississauga-area road trips these days.

Milton waited until sudden death to secure victory over the now Port Credit-based Mississauga Chargers September 17, and came about as close as possible to doing likewise within the confines of Streetsville's Vic Johnston Memorial Arena Tuesday night.

Veteran Dean Strong potted a doorstep scramble with a mere three seconds remaining to eclipse the Derbys 2-1. Assisting on the golden goal were Jon Ornelas and Casey Gilholm, who along with fellow defenceman Jason Fortino were returning from minor

injuries.

The low-scoring affair — a rarity between these two teams — lifted the IceHawks' record to 5-4.

Kain Tisi backstopped the visitors to victory, making 18 straight saves after getting handcuffed on Streetsville's first shot — a long-range bullet by Darren Rowntree before the game was three minutes old.

The Derbys would nurse that lead for the next two periods with fundamentally-sound trap tactics that maximized their biggest asset — size.

But Tisi's stabilizing presence between the pipes and a couple of impressive penalty kills

kept the IceHawks in it long enough for rookie Ryan McInerney to break Tudor Petkov's shutout three minutes into the final frame.

His lengthy blast bounced off the hometown cager — part of the tandem that was thoroughly victimized by Milton in opening-round play last spring — and trickled over the line.

Leading scorer Ryan Angelow and Jeff Caister set up the equalizer.

Although Milton got back two of its defencemen Tuesday, Andrew Bonello — the only seasoned blueliner of this year's crop — left after the first period with a banged up left side, courtesy of a rather nasty spear sustained three nights earlier in Buffalo.

In other player movement, 18-year-old David Hammond made his IceHawks debut in Streetsville. The sizable forward last toiled with the Markham midgets and was a late cut of the OHL Oshawa Generals.

The IceHawks will look to make it three in a row tonight in Burlington. Saturday evening they travel to Brampton, where former Capital and resident agitator Ryan Silveira will make his long-awaited return from a 10-game suspension.

Both games start at 7:30 p.m.
