

Players to stage 'clever comedy'

aughing at a string of attempted murders wouldn't usually be socially acceptable.

But later this month, that's exactly what viewers will be doing while watching the Milton Players Theatre Group's latest offering, Murder at the Howard Johnson's.

Billed as a clever comedy, director Geoff Ford makes no qualms about the fact that the characters are far from intelligent — and that's what makes it so humorous.

"Some of the stuff is so inane — it's so stupid, it's incredible," Mr. Ford said.

The theatre group will be doing five performances between next Friday and November 1.

One of the unique aspects of the play, written by Americans Ron Clark and Sam Bobrick, is that it has just three characters—a husband and wife played by Sharon Beddoes and her real-life husband, Tim, plus a dentist/lover played by Graham Morley.

The play depicts a love triangle gone wrong. The two acts are set in a hotel room. In the first, the wife, Arlene, and her lover, Mitchell, are plotting to kill Arlene's husband, a used car salesman.

The plot twists and turns from there with hilarious results, Mr. Ford said.

"It's light and fluffy," he said of the play.

And there's no attempt at political correctness.

"At one point, there'll be tomatoes flying at the stage from women in the audience (at the two male characters)."

Each of the three actors is a veteran performer, Mr. Ford said, and they work so well together they've been ahead of schedule in their rehearsals.

Although Mr. Ford said he prefers directing larger casts, he's enjoyed being able to concentrate on each individual during rehearsals.

A long-time Milton resident who now lives in Mississauga, Mr. Ford has been with the Milton Players for almost 17 years. He started his involvement moving sets and then began acting.

Directing is what he enjoys most, he said, because of "the sense of power."

This is the eighth Milton Players play he's directed.

Something new the Milton Players will be doing from now on is giving each play a rating. Murder at the Howard Johnson's is rated 'parental guidance', Mr. Ford said, because of some sexual innuendoes plus some swearing.

The biggest challenges Mr. Ford said the group has dealt with in getting the play ready stem from space limitations. The stage is fairly small, requiring some creativity. "Because of the limitations of the stage, it's tricky maneuvering sometimes," he said.

The play runs October 24, 25, 30, 31 and November 1 at the Milton Seniors' Activity Centre, 500 Childs Dr. The dinner theatre dates have sold out, but tickets still remain for the show-only performances October 24, 30 and 31. Doors open at 7:30 p.m. for each of these performances, with an 8 p.m. show time. Refreshments and a cash bar will be available.

Tickets for show-only performances cost \$15 and can be purchased with cash or by cheque at Delacourt's at Main and Martin streets or by calling (905) 875-0629.

It'll feature readings, displays, book signings, activities and face painting with Canadian authors, illustrators and story-


