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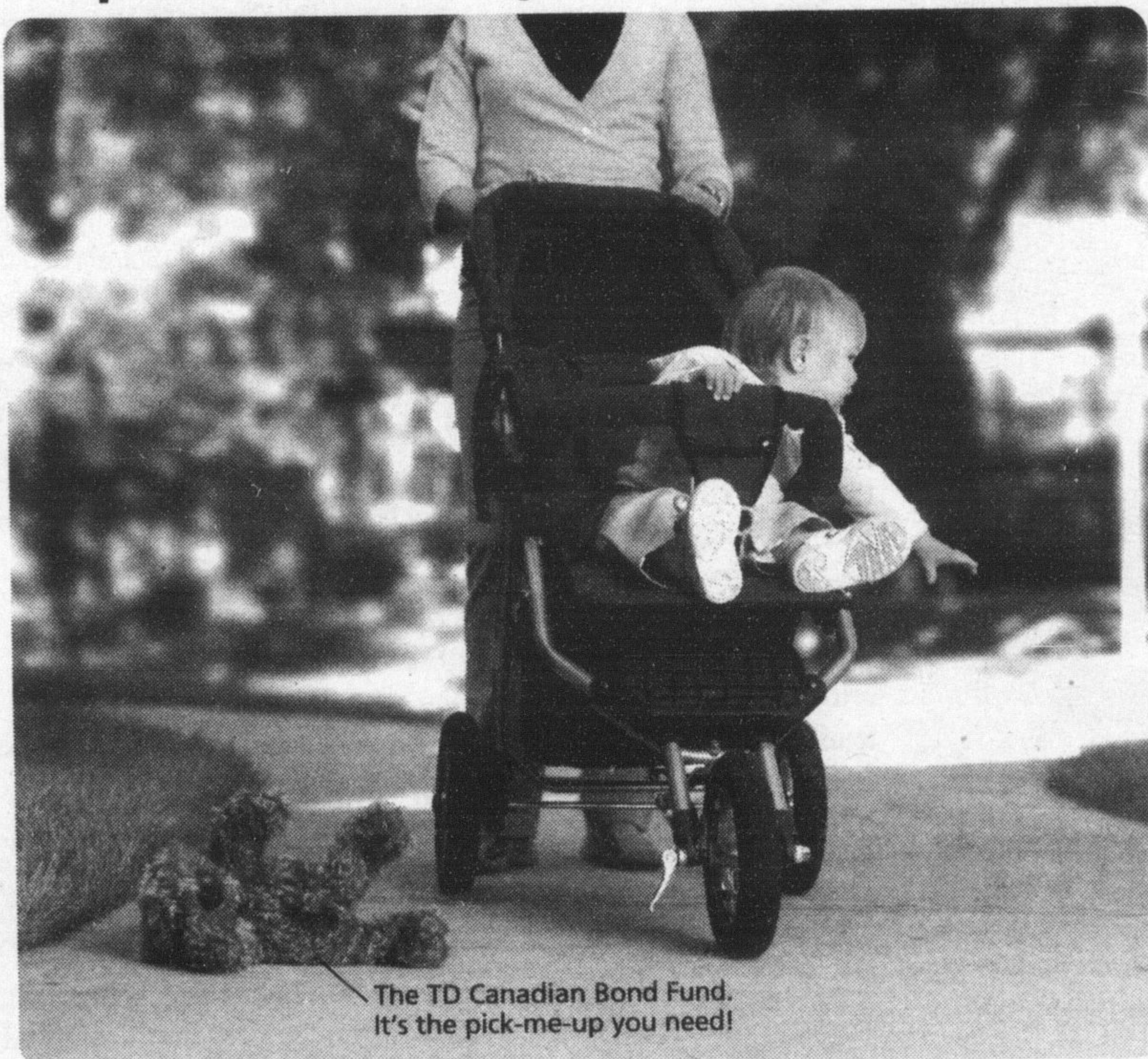


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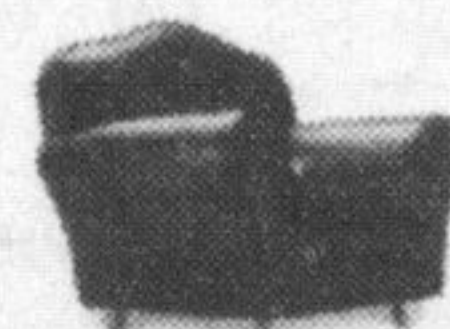
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Territorial dispute

Sr. Mustangs embarrass Georgetown on gridiron

Massacre, cakewalk, annihilation.

Milton District fans no doubt used all three of these — and a host of other colourful terms — to describe how their football seniors victimized Georgetown Friday.

No matter how it was characterized, the 59-0 opening-round rout was just plain brutal.

Said head coach Keith Pearce, "For the most part, we pretty much scored whenever we got the ball."

Bear in mind that the visitors are just returning to the gridiron scene this fall and weren't expected to make any sort of playoff impact.

But all semblance of competitiveness was laid to waste in the second quarter, when the Mustangs amassed four touchdowns to ignite an afternoon-long embarrassment of riches.

Overall, James McIntosh and Daryl Meinen scored two majors apiece to lead the hit parade and power MD into quarterfinal play.

While hardly a suitable tune-up for this Friday's clash with host Oakville Trafalgar, the first-round mismatch did offer two sources of encouragement for a Mustang team determined to make it back to the tier two finals.

Tailback Tim Anderson looked no worse for wear in his return from a concussion — and got things rolling with a 65-yard touchdown run just minutes into the game.

Furthermore, Ryan Mitchell booted his first field goal of the year and made good on all eight convert attempts. The reliable kicker's ongoing effectiveness is to say the least promising for the

Mustangs, who now go up against a team that vanquished them by a mere three points last month.

"It (kicking game) could very well be the difference," admitted Pearce.

Offensive co-ordinator Ian McIntosh and quarterback Jay Price did a nice job mixing up the attack Friday, while rounding out the scoring with single majors were Brandon Byers, Lee Fritenburg and Jon Van Es.

Now two wins away from a return trip to Hamilton's IvorWynne Stadium, the Mustangs take on OT at 2 p.m. Friday. If victorious, they'll cross over to face one of the West Division's top finishers November 7.

Meanwhile, MD's juniors will host OT in quarterfinal play Thursday at 2 p.m.

EC cagers claim tourney title

The titles are piling up for E.C. Drury's senior girls basketball team.

Just one week after securing consolation championship honours at their own tournament, the Spartans won the primary crown at North Bay's Chippewawa Invitational Saturday.

Drury put the finishing touches on its title drive by disposing of the hosts 44-34 in the finals. This was due in large part to Katherine Greaves, who persevered through a minor injury to lead the way with a dozen points.

Laura Wellstead's 11-point performance and supporting contributions by Victoria Thurston, Allison Radcliffe, Sarah Fredricks, Brooke Harper and

Courtney Campbell aided in the championship win — the ninth straight for EC.

While rather dominant in the title match, the Spartans needed a fair amount of drama to get by their opening-round competition. Kicking things off against an older and bigger Sault Ste. Marie team, the local ladies forced overtime with a last-second basket by Campbell. Then Wellstead provided the heroics in the extra session, nailing a shot with no time remaining to punctuate a 42-41 triumph.

From there, Greaves and Thurston reached double-digits to help knock off Algonquin 39-33 in the semi-finals. Wellstead offered nine points, plus some spirited defense.
