Rodent knocks out power

A large number of Milton residents found themselves without hydro early Wednesday morning.

Affected residents were in the dark from about 6:20 a.m. to almost 8 a.m. before power was restored.

Richard Murray, vice-president of operations at Milton Hydro, said the problem started with a furry critter.

"A rodent got into a high voltage compartment of one of our sub stations," Mr. Murray said, adding that the culprit damaged a breaker mechanism.

The sub station is located on Wilson Avenue, just north of Main Street.

Mr. Murray said the power failure affected "a large residential area" including Dorset Park — the area bordered by Main Street, Thompson Road, Steeles Avenue and Ontario Street — and houses along Childs Drive.

Mr. Murray said the hydro was restored quickly with a back-up power supply. And the sub station was expected to be in working order today.

Advance polls up

Turnout at advance polls for this year's municipal election jumped by a staggering 88 per cent compared to the 2000 election.

And Town clerk Troy McHarg said a combination of those increased numbers and some intriguing local election races could lead to a higher voter turnout overall.

There were some people "who were in town in the area and thought they should cast a ballot," Mr. McHarg said. "On the first day there were some line-ups because the turnout was greater than anticipated."

In total, 1,210 of an approximately 29,000 eligible voters visited polls held at Milton Mall Saturday and Wednesday.

In 2000, 643 voted over two days of advanced polls.

The total voter turnout in 2000 was 38 per cent.

The average voter turnout in Ontario hovers in the mid-30 per cent range.

Polls will be open Monday from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m.
