
Mike Boughton, Ward 2

Boughton says he can't wait to get started

Sharply dressed in a dark blue dress shirt with a tie, sleeves rolled up slightly, and in pleated black pants, Mike Boughton methodically snips the hair of one in a long list of customers that have graced his Main Street East barbershop.

He says his 37 years as a hairstylist has given him a unique perspective on Milton, of where's it been and should be going.

"Sitting here in the barbershop, I hear people talking about what's happening in the



community," Boughton, 58.

Having a broad scope of the issues is the kind of experience Mr. Boughton said he hopes to bring to council.

He said he's excited by the

opportunity of representing constituents' interests and not just their hairstyling demands.

Those interests include addressing the Town's threehour parking bylaw, keeping the library at its Brown Street site if plans to build another proceed, and an arts and culture centre.

"The main thing is to work on town council as a team. I don't think there should be competition between Ward 1 and Ward 4 and Ward 2."

One more thing, he said with a laugh - no free haircuts for fellow councillors or staff. It's strictly a business decision.


Mark Curtis, Ward 2

-Curtis says he's committed to his new role

Father Mark Curtis's passion may be singing, but he says he's just as committed to his new role as a Milton politician.

Known as Canada's singing priest, Mr. Curtis travels the world, performing in large music halls and in front of intimate church groups, as a singer or motivational speaker. He'll be cutting back on the number of appearances to devote his time to Milton council.

As the newest Ward 2 councillor, his bombastic voice will only be heard when speaking to



political issues.

"The only singing I'll be doing at council is singing the praises of Miltonians," he said, though he won't object to leading a round of 'Happy Birthday', if asked.

Mr. Curtis, whose base church is St. Simon's Anglican Church in Oakville, is one of two new Ward 4 councillors who will bring the concerns of residents from the established, older part of Milton to council.

Throughout his campaigning - which he said involved knocking on 4,000 doors not once but twice - the 47-yearold was struck by how many were abreast of issues. That will keep him on the political hot seat.

"People were really up on things," Mr. Curtis said. "They are very educated voters."


The issues include development, the need for adequate transit and a movie theatre.

Mowbray says she's ready to work with honesty and integrity

An avid golfer with an impressive eight-handicap, Jan Mowbray was leading after two rounds in a 1999 golf tournament when, at home resting, she felt a pit lodge in her stomach. She had mistakenly marked her score card wrong, awarding herself a birdie instead of a par.

"I had to tell them (golf officials) the next day," said the native New Zealander. "Your doing her homework to get up, water quality and roadside word is everything. If you caught up on Milton policies,
