

## Fatigued IceHawks dumped by Derbys

Hectic schedule takes its toll in Streetsville

he IceHawks didn't so much wrap up their most hectic season stretch as limp to its conclusion.

Closing out a four-games-in-five-nights run at Vic Johnston Memorial Arena Tuesday, Milton's blatantly fatigued juniors had little to no oomph up front — and no saving grace between the pipes.

The end result was a 5-1 defeat at the steadily-improving Streetsville Derbys, who to their credit two meetings with the IceHawks, who stuck to an effectively simple and physical game plan en route to bumping off yet another top-four opponent.

Nevertheless, the IceHawks' depleted ranks and diminished energy level had as much to do with the lopsided verdict which dropped them to 21-14-0-1 and further hindered waning hopes for a top-three finish.

Adversely affected by a lack of work early on and the generally-drained aura that plagued his team, Kain Tisi just wasn't up to par in his most recent appearance. Coming off a superb effort in Burlington Sunday, he looked shaky on goals one, three and four — the latest of which prompted his exit with just under five minutes remaining.

Offensively, Jonathan Ornelas was the lone marksman — scoring for the fifth straight game to knot things up midway through the night. Drawing assists were Jeff Caister and Brad Snetsinger.

The Derbys would restore their lead on the powerplay five minutes later — catching Tisi out of position on a lengthy rebound — and then put things out of reach in the third.

While banged-up captain Lee Swallow is now back from a much-needed respite, the IceHawks were still going with just three


forward lines as workhorse centre Dean Strong began nursing an undisclosed upper body injury.

Milton had plenty of close-range opportunities Tuesday, but suffered equally from a lack of finish and sharp cage work by Nunzio Presta. The IceHawks also took about a handful of ill-timed penalties and were repeatedly muscled off the puck by a Derbys team that boasts about as much physical prowess as they have in several

Former Milton director David Dermo now the general manager of Streetsville was on the opposing bench Tuesday in replacement of vacationing owner/head coach Randy Gumbley.

Dermo's Derbys have now won their last close out 2003 regular season play tonight at home against Hamilton.
