> The December 26 earthquake left more than 28,500 dead and more than 30,000 injured. The Iranian Red Crescent rescued 11,000 people from the rubble and has distributed emergency aid to survivors, but some 75,000 people are homeless with many thousands

still sleeping outdoors in freezing temperatures with little or no belongings.

Consequently, the threat of respiratory tract infections has risen sharply. In addition, the area traditionally suffers from endemic diseases such as malaria and has recently experienced typhoid and cholera epidemics.
