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



Parrott's killer may be out in 9 1/2 years

Friends and family of slain Miltonian Murray Parrott say the fact his killer will be in prison with a life sentence offers little consolation — especially since he'll be eligible for parole in nineand-a-half years.

"No amount of time could give him back the third of his life he lost," said his wife of 27 years, Pat Parrott, after Judge Bruce Durno sentenced Douglas Stokes to life in

Champion wins third in Ontario

The Champion took home a third-place award for General Excellence in the Community Newspaper Ontario Association's 2003 Better Newspapers Competition.

prison yesterday with no chance of parole for 12 years.

Mr. Stokes, 21, has already been in custody for two-and-a-half years, so he can apply for parole in nine-and-a-half years.

Since Douglas Stokes pleaded guilty to the 2001 second-degree murder of Mr. Parrott, 53, a sentence of life in prison was mandatory. The question being dealt with throughout the hearing was when he could seek parole.


Judge Durno made his decision yesterday afternoon at Superior Court of Justice in Milton as Ms Parrott sat in the front row, surrounded by supporters.

Mr. Stokes' mother, from St. Catharines, left the court room before the judge finished reading his decision.

There's no evidence that Mr. Parrott showed any violence toward Mr. Stokes, as had been testified, Judge Durno said.

He said he didn't believe Mr. Parrott pulled out his knife — with which he was eventually killed — in a threatening manner as he walked home from the former Knight Cap bar on Main Street.


