Area businesses share expertise and knowledge

Saifu Mawji says he's constantly looking to better his local company, Thru-Way Trailers.

For 35 years — the last five in Milton on Market Drive — Thru-Way, comprised of between 40 and 50 employees, has been manufacturing specialized/customized trailer beds for trucks to haul heavy materials like bricks and steel.

"We're always interested in being world-class," said Mr. Mawji, the company's president. "We want to be the best in the world in trailer manufacturing."

This desire to improve his business drove him to attend a briefing held by an association called the Excellence in Manufacturing Consortium (EMC) at Hugh Foster Hall Wednesday. Attended by nine businesses, the briefing was organized by the Town of Milton. The EMC, designed to share information, has more than 550 manufacturers in more than 100 communities in Ontario, including Burlington, as well as in New Brunswick.

EMC president and general manager Al Diggins said in an interview the association will hold its first official meeting May 5. Two companies have agreed to join. He invited manufacturers to come see what they think. "Come on out and give it a taste," Mr. Diggins said. "We're not out to sell anything."

In his slide presentation, he told businesses that the EMC concept sprouted when, through his business dealings, he discovered that Midland, with a population of 12,000, had 18 manufacturers and only two of them knew each other.

Eventually, the EMC grew and has created more regions along the way. Each region has a unique EMC to address the different issues that exist in each one. "Each community has its own personality," Mr. Diggins told the briefing.

When a member has a question or problem to solve, it calls a field service advisor who contacts the right member for the appropriate help. Developing trust, Mr. Diggins said, is a key factor among EMC members offering to assist each other.

Andrew Siltala, Milton's economic development officer, said he learned about EMC and thought it would benefit manufacturers in town to hear about its work. He estimates about 30 per cent of industries in Milton are manufacturers, accounting for the greatest percentage of the town's workforce.

Mr. Mawji said EMC could prove helpful.

For example, he said Thru-Way buys screws designed to drill into trailer floors made of wood from a local company. Perhaps that company will have information about a particular kind of wood Thru-way might be able to use when it constructs its trailers.
