Grade Representative Elections, Fine Arts Executive Council Elections, and Student Athletic Association Elections are all coming up, so get involved and sign up soon!

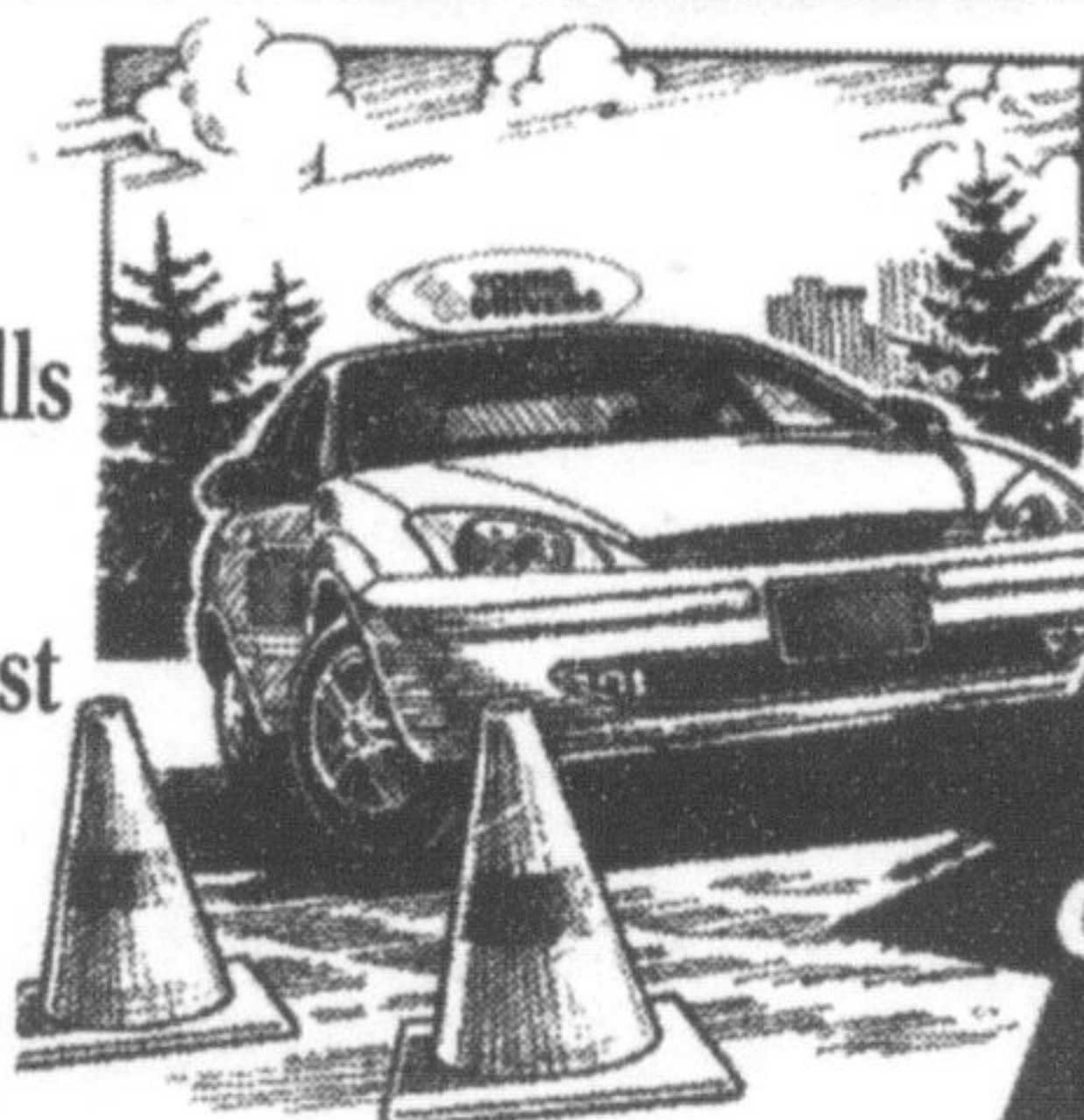

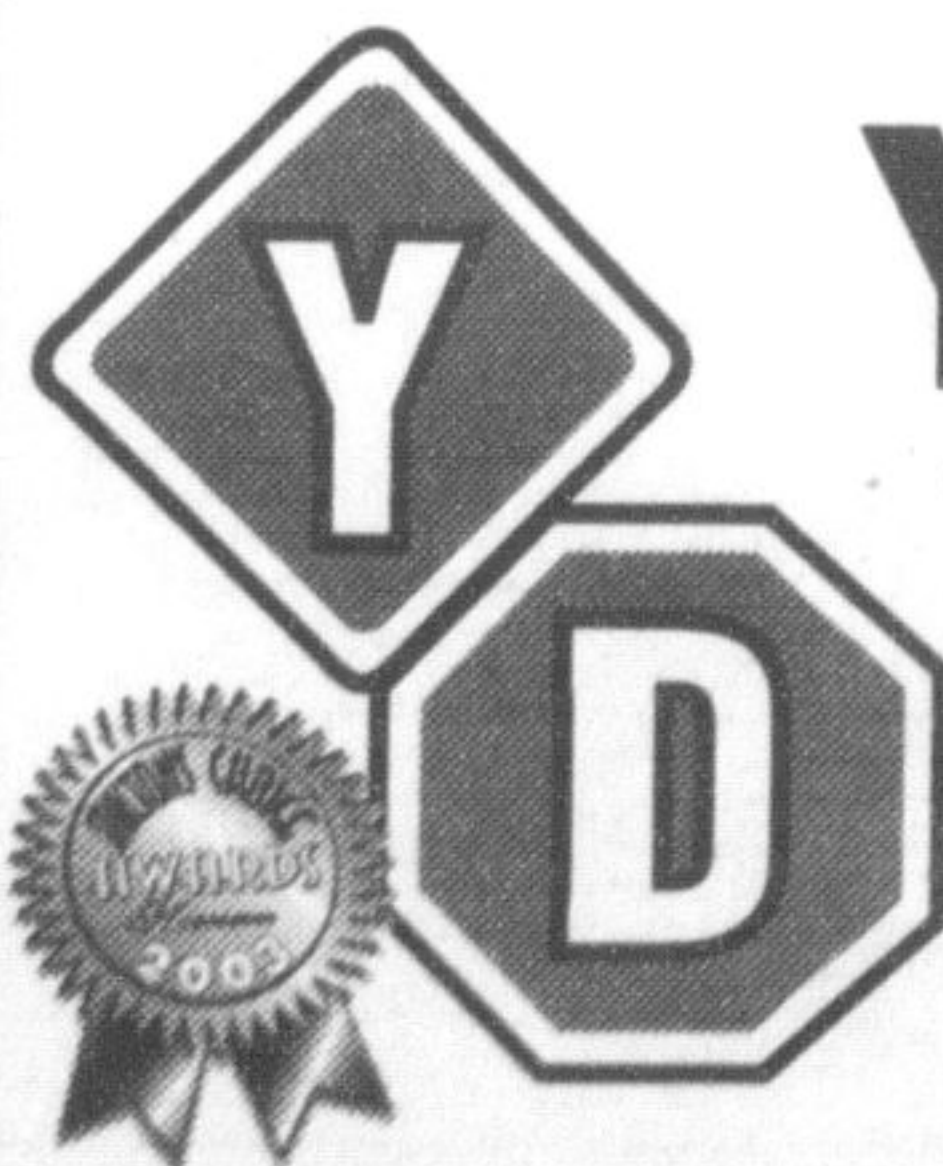
