
The game-six triumph cemented division bragging rights for the regular season champion Admirals, who're now set to battle the red-hot Rochester Americans in the Western Conference finals.

Call it a victory — at least of the moral variety.

Milton held its guests to a respectable five goals in the last two frames, primarily because of fortified man-to-man coverage and a sharp reduction in trips to the sin bin.


