Dump Mustangs to reach Halton's final four

Bishop Reding's boys baseball team steamrolled its way into the semifinals — and flattened its crosstown rivals in the process.

Just 24 hours removed from a hard-fought opening round win over Oakville's Iroquois Ridge Trailblazers, Milton District had nothing left to give against the defending regional champion Royals Tuesday afternoon at Maplehurst Ball Park.

Showing little sympathy to their fellow Miltonians, BR mounted an early cushion and cruised to an 8-0 whitewash — the second straight shutout victory this year over the Mustangs.

RBI leader Nick Mazzaratto accounted for half the scoring with back-to-back tworun singles, while five other Royals

posted hits to aid in the quarterfinal blowout.

Driving in the other runs were Marcas Gray, Jamie Pedra, Ryan Taylor and Liam ennant.

Matt Mastrangelo saw the lion's share of mound work for the victors, working four innings after a solid start by Sean

The Mustangs had runners on third three times Tuesday, but just couldn't cash them in. They offered hope for a more

Meanwhile, Reding — still unbeaten after disposing of MD — took on Burlington's Notre Dame Irish in yesterday afternoon's semifinals at Maplehurst.

Results were not available at press time. If victorious, the Royals will have a chance to defend their Halton title at Burlington's Nelson Park Wednesday afternoon - most likely against the Burlington Central Trojans.




