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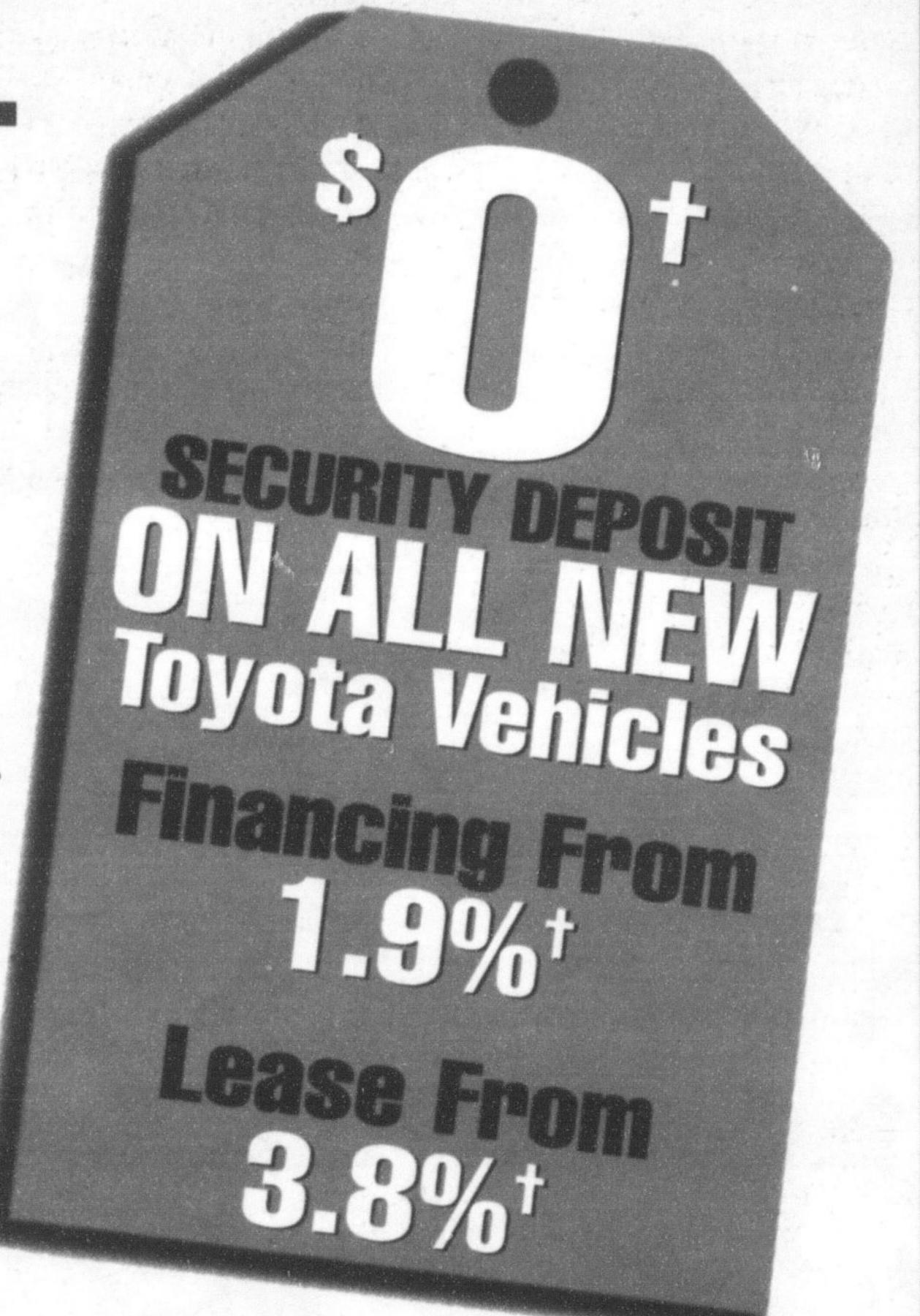


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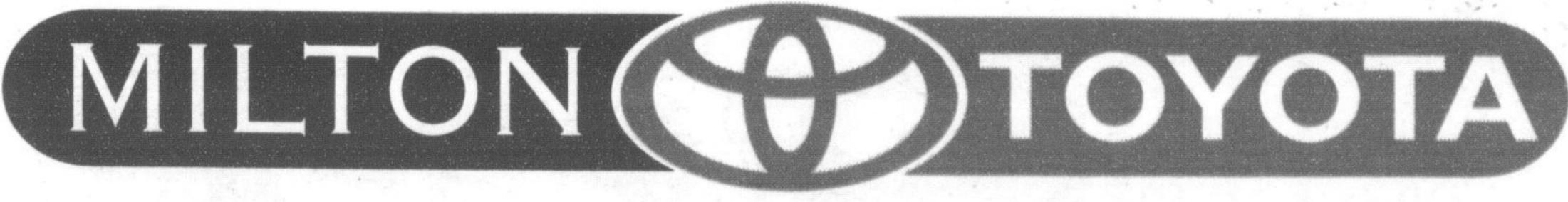


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Catholic school board eyes \$9 million deficit

Board may face hard choices to present balanced budget

Although the Halton District Catholic School Board is awaiting firm provincial funding numbers for next year, staff are projecting a \$8.9-million shortfall for the 2004-05 budget.

Still a "very preliminary proposed budget," Education Director Lou Piovesan said at last Tuesday's board meeting, the process of whittling down the figures will be challenging - especially since by law the board must submit a balanced budget to the Province.

Although the provincial budget was announced last Tuesday, board Superintendent of Business Services and Treasurer Paul McMahon said the Ministry of Education won't release its General Legislative Grants (GLG) for several more days at the earliest.

As a result, the board's first draft of its 2004-05 budget is predicated on a number of assumptions, not the least of which is incorporating a 2 per cent funding increase for the salary and benefit portion of the foundation grant. This, among other factors, said Mr. Piovesan, is responsible for the estimated \$8.9-million deficit.

"We hope that's a worse-case scenario," said Mr. McMahon.

Among the other assumptions is a further per cent increase for Continuing Education, administration and transportation funding formulas.

Also part of the equation are Average Daily Enrolment (ADE) numbers, which the board has submitted to the ministry in order for grants to be calculated. Staff have estimated an ADE of 17,261.5 elementary students — an increase of 165, or 1 per cent, over 2003-04. An ADE of 8,142 secondary students has been estimated - an increase of 475.5, or 6.2 per cent, over 2003/04. Other enrolment estimates include those for French Immersion and English-As-Second-Language as well as summer school, international languages and adult education.

The board has also projected total preliminary operating revenues of \$169.7 million, an increase of 1.3 per cent over 2003-04. Based on the board's assumptions, preliminary expenditure projections total \$178.7 million — \$116.8 million for classroom expenditures, \$61.9 million for nonclassroom expenditures. The result is the \$8.9 million shortfall.

Mr. McMahon told trustees last Tuesday night they will receive an intermediate budget in early June followed by a balanced budget later that month — all contingent, of course, on Queen's Park coming through with funding numbers.

"It is likely that the estimated revenues in future budget drafts will not increase by the amount of the shortfall," said Mr. McMahon in his written report.
