

Police officer assaulted Monday

A police officer was struck Monday night after attempting to notify a motorist of a traffic violation.

Just after 5 p.m., an officer with Halton Regional Police followed the motorist into his driveway.

The driver became agitated when he saw the officer and began to yell and scream, police said.

He then hit the officer with his forearm.

Charged with assault of a peace officer and assault with the intent of resisting arrest is a 42-year-old Hume Way man.

Police call off chase

A seven-minute vehicle pursuit was ended by police for public safety reasons when the suspect headed into a residential area.

The pursuit took place last Friday just before 1 p.m. on Fourth Line, just north of Derry Road. An officer stopped a driver for a Highway Traffic Act violation, and the lone male driver sped away.

A blue Honda Accord fled northbound on Fourth Line, eastbound on Hwy. 401, southbound on Winston Churchill Boulevard and then westbound on Derry Road, where police stopped chasing the suspect.

Police are looking for a white male, about 35 years old with an olive complexion, short dark hair, a mustache and a goatee.

Man charged with drunk driving

Police laid a drunk driving charge after a driver lost control of his vehicle Sunday night.

Just before midnight, police responded to the scene of a vehicle that had flipped over into a ditch on Derry Road, east of Trafalgar Road.

A 25-year-old Oakville man was charged with having over the legal limit of alcohol in his blood.

Police lay fraud charge

Police laid a fraud charge May 31 in connection with a car that was purchased with a bad cheque in September.

The car was purchased for about \$34,000 from the Toronto Auto Auction on Lawson Road, but the purchaser's account was closed so the cheque couldn't be cashed.

Charged with fraud over the amount of \$5,000 is a 48-year-old Oakville man.

Man charged in card theft

A 27-year-old Commercial Street man has been charged in connection with playing cards that went missing in February from Comic Express on Main Street East.

A police investigation took place and the man was charged with possession of stolen property under \$5,000.

Bright yellow flowers and glossy green foliage combined with self-cleaning rose hips meaning no pruning combine to deliver great effect with little maintenance.

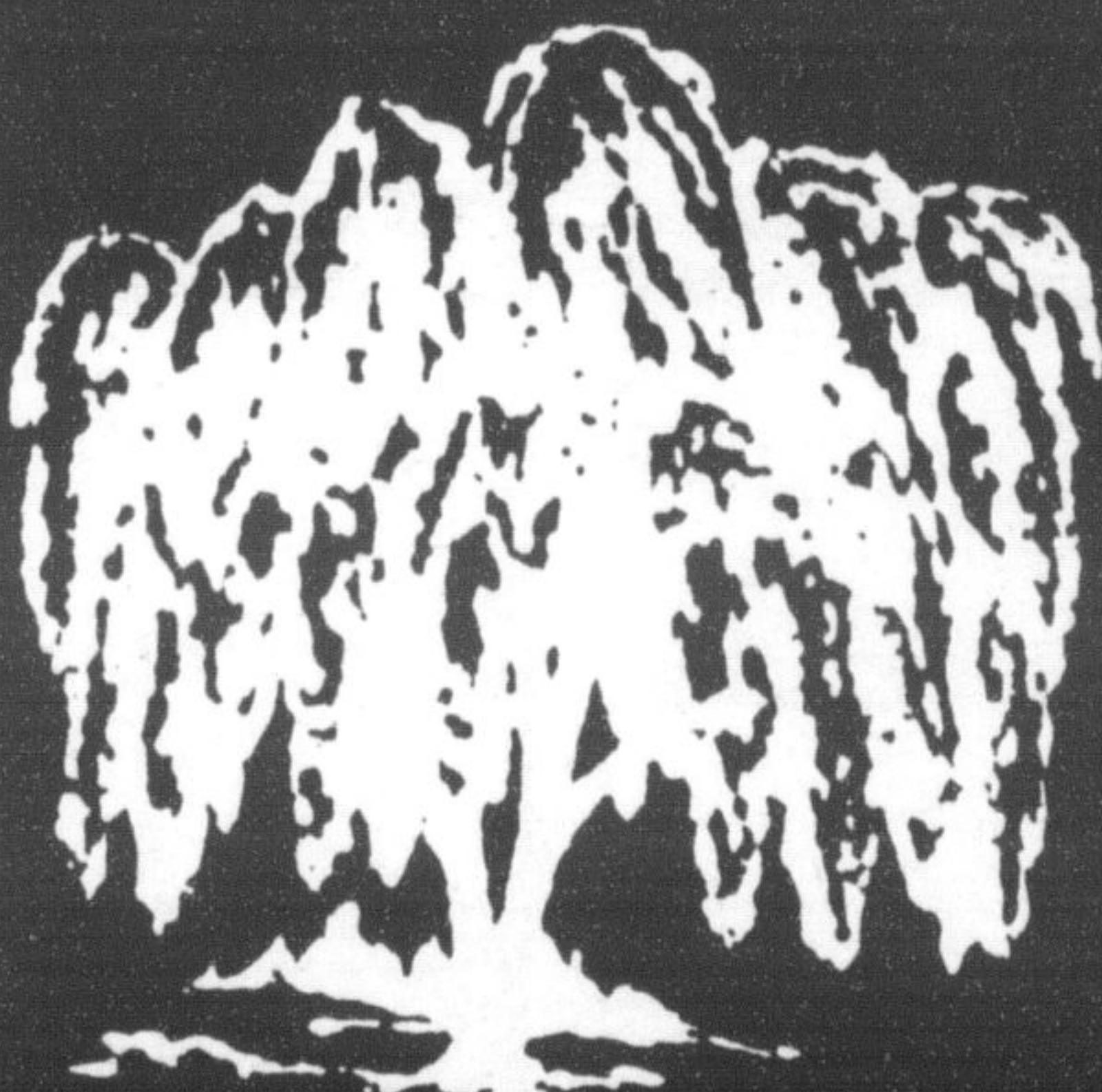
