June 1903

Mayor Dice wishes it understood that no bathing will be allowed in the pond here at any time and at the head of the pond only after dark, with bathers to wear bathing suits. Those who violate the above regulations will be prosecuted.

Is there any good reason why the old fashioned verandas which have disfigured Main Street for generations and some of which are shaky should be allowed to stand until they fall down of their own accord? They should be removed and they should go along with the wooden sidewalks which are about to be torn up. Their owners should follow the example of the council and get out of the old rut and unite to modernize the town.

The annual meeting of the Halton try' tells the reader that your ment insurance and public service, Farmers' Institute and Women's Institute was held in Milton. The places to hold meetings the coming winter were selected: Postville, Appleby, Lowville, Hornby, Brookville, McCurdy's, Norval, Acton and Milton. The annual meeting of the Woman's Institute was held in the Royal Templars' Hall in Milton. Membership now totals nearly 500, being more than double that of last year. Mrs. (Dr.) Robertson was elected president; Mrs. F.C. Willmott vice president; Mrs. S. Bews secretary-treasurer.

Geo. Lardie, sr., and daughter Miss Rosalie, of Old Mission, Mich., who have been stopping at the Wallace House for several days, left for Hamilton on Monday. Mr. Lardie was one of the early settlers of this town, arriving here with his parents over half a century ago. He conducted a stave-cutting and cooperage business in the East Ward for several years and afterwards removed to Michigan, where he has been successful as a merchant and is now living private. Mr. and Miss Lardie called on friends while in town and had photographs taken of the old stave factory and the house he erected, now occupied by Wm. Durnan. They will visit Niagara Falls, Toronto, Montreal and other places in Canada before returning home.

The camp at Niagara opened on Tuesday. The 20th Lorne Rifles, instead of crossing the lake by steamer as formerly, went through on a G.T.R. special train. The regiment is for the first time under command of Lieut.-Col. Appelbe, who is a most efficient officer. On account of the great scarcity of men recruiting was very difficult, but the companies are fairly well filled, the total strength of all ranks being 145. The officers, with the exception of Majors Fox and Panton, are all or nearly all in camp. Lieut. K.D. Panton is attached to the Division Staff as assistant musketry instructor.
