Hart Jr. makes pro boxing debut tonight

Call it a new beginning for Matt Hart Jr. Tonight the local pugilist will start proving himself all over again — doing so with his long-awaited professional debut in Edmonton.


"I'm pretty excited and ready for the challenge," said the 27-year-old welterweight, who ended his amateur career ranked second provincially and with an overall record of 17-4.

Hart Jr.'s jump to the pros was expected to come a few months back, but fundamental differences with would-be manager John Melich of Brampton postponed the

Explained Milton's outspoken boxer, "Basically he wanted full control over me, so we parted ways. The only person who's going to have 100 per cent say about Matt Hart is Matt Hart."

Now dealing with a handful of different managers — including Hamilton's Dave Finch, who helped arrange his first pro encounter — the local fighter is set to take on Calgary's Anthony Lassard, who'll no doubt have the home crowd advantage.

But Hart Jr. points out that his upcoming opponent has just recently returned to the ring after a three-year absence. "That's a long time to be off, where as I was in there

competing. I think that gives me an edge."

Without a points system at the pro level, Hart Jr. will now have to concentrate on punch quality rather than quantity.

"I'm not throwing seven or eightpunch combinations anymore," said the impend-

ing pro fighter, who's still working with longtime trainer Billy Martin and sparring with such seasoned veterans as two-time national champ Brian Mackie. "I'm waiting on my punches more and trying to make them really count.

"My training has been going great. I know I've got to prove myself all over again, but I feel that I'm ready for it."

Hart Jr. expects to make roughly \$1,000 (his expenses are paid) for his four-round pro debut, and down the road is hoping to get on a card tentatively scheduled at Mississauga's Hershey Centre in September.

"Anything close to home I'll be all over," he stressed.

Meanwhile, the Junior Red Sox gave up eight runs in the last inning and fell 12-9 to the Mississauga Tigers Tuesday night.



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Sr. Sox hold their own at Newmarket tourney

Heading into last weekend, there was some debate over the Senior Red Sox' worthiness to be included in the Newmarket Tournament.

Nobody's questioning that decision anymore.

The only non-A level entry at the 10team showcase, Milton more than held its own — winning two of three round-robin games, the latter over the defending provincial champs.

Unfortunately that wasn't quite enough to advance, as the narrowest of run differentials knocked the local seniors out of title contention. But measuring up to the weekend opposition no doubt provided legitimiate solace for George Moore and company. "We definitely proved we belonged

there," said the Red Sox manager.

Milton's lone defeat came against Leaside Saturday morning, when a windassisted homer in the fourth inning broke a 1-1 stalemate and spoiled a complete game four-hitter by Adam Finkbeiner.

The Red Sox were flawless defensively, while Taylor Lawton tied things up on a Leaside error.

Sandwiching the round two setback were low-scoring decisions against the hosts and Markham, Ontario's 2003 gold medalists.

The latter win — by a 4-1 margin — was highlighted by stellar fielding and a complete-game gem from Adam Ahearn, who surrendered just six hits.

"The defense and pitching were fantastic all weekend and everything came together against Markham, including our bats," stressed Moore, whose charges had a dozen hits in the round-robin ending triumph Saturday afternoon.

Milton kicked off the weekend by edging Newmarket 3-2 Friday evening.

Initiating a complete-game tournament trend, Ian Zettle went the full seven innings and stayed strong down the stretch to allow the Red Sox to rally from a 2-0 deficit.

His five-hit performance was complemented by sharp defense, while at the plate Kurt Mitchell belted a single in the fourth to score both the tying and winning runs.

The seniors can push themselves over the .500 mark in league play tomorrow afternoon with a double-header sweep of Brampton. Game one starts at noon at Brian Best Park.
