
Mr. Stewart's involvement in 4-H at the national level includes serving two terms with the Canadian 4-H Council's board of directors.

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the first car the museum acquired," said Caroline Rose, a co-ordinator of the celebration.

"The T.T.C. 1326 is a wooden car that has been restored. Guests will be able to ride on the car on the day of the celebration."

The Halton County Radial Railway, located on Guelph Line, was founded on New Year's Eve in 1953 when the land was purchased from the Town of Nassagaweya due to back taxes.

Over the next 18 years, the original railway was re-established and now 67 cars, acquired from all across Canada, are on display at the museum. Opened to the public in 1972, the museum has had well over 100,000 people visit and experience the heritage of the trains.

The original Rockwood Station was relocated to the property in 1971 when it was rescued from demolition.

It has since been restored and its authentic look adds charm to the museum.

#### Museum run by volunteers

Completely run by volunteers, the Halton County Radial Railway has approximately 900 members but only about 100 of them are actively involved in running the museum's activities.

The museum will open at 11 a.m. July 10 and the anniversary festivities are scheduled to begin at 1 p.m.

The celebration is open to the public with admission being \$9.50, or \$6.50 for youth and \$8.50 for seniors. Children under 3 years of age are admitted free.

"We invite everyone to come out and help us celebrate the museum's anniversary with us," said Ms Rose.

"It should be a lot of fun."
