Looks like taxes on the rise again

Halton residents could see a \$45.30 tax increase and a \$46 hike in their water and waste water bills next year.

These are the tentative numbers the Region's financial gurus are predicting for 2005, as a result of a projected 4.2 per cent tax hike and 8.2 per cent increase in water and waste water rates.

Council reviewed a report Wednesday from Halton Commissioner of Corporate Services and Regional Treasurer Jane MacCaskill that lists some of the financial challenges the Region will face next year, thus leading to a tax hike.

The amount taxes will go up ultimately depends on the Halton Region Police Service budget, which hasn't been finalized yet.

The report predicts the police budget could go up

by 8.4 per cent next year, which would make up \$26.70 of the tax increase for the average homeowner based on a \$250,000 assessment.

The other part that contributes to the increase is the tax-supported base budget. Council approved that this budget be prepared on the basis of a 1.5 per cent tax increase, not to exceed 2.4 per cent, or \$18.60.

With the predicted increases in the police and tax budgets, this would mean an overall tax rate hike of 4.2 per cent, or \$45.30.

Burlington Councillor Mike Wallace said he's comfortable with the 1.5 per cent increase.

"As long as the increase comes in under inflation, I'll be satisfied," he said.

The water and waste water rate-supported base budget will have a 6.5 per cent rate increase, with a ceiling of 8.2 per cent. Based on an average con-

sumption of 300 cubic metres, this would tack an extra \$46 onto your bill.

Milton Mayor Gord Krantz, Burlington Councillor Jack Dennison and Oakville Councillor Allan Elgar opposed the water and waste water hike.

Mr. Dennison said the budget needs to be reviewed, looking for cost reductions.

"We have to work harder on it to spread that increase further down the line," he said.

Mr. Wallace told his fellow councillors to make some suggestions on the budget and have a debate.

"I want to see some action from people, instead of just chatting," he said.
